MEMORIES OF BARBARA EDWARDS

On 13th July, family and friends gathered for a service at St John's Church to celebrate the life of Barbara Edwards who passed away in December 2021. Many tributes were shared during the service including the following from Sue Doley -

"I know that Barbara had many friends, and some were long standing relationships. I only knew her for a comparatively short time, but she was a lovely special friend to me.

I met her when I first came to St Johns in 2010 but it wasn't until 2014 when I was preparing for my confirmation that I suddenly realised that I needed a sponsor for the ceremony. There was no-one who qualified for this within my friends and family, so I tentatively asked Barbara and was delighted when she readily agreed. She came with me, was very supportive and kept me calm as I was running late as usual! This was the start of an unexpected and close friendship.

She invited me to her home where I spent many happy times chatting with her. She was always welcoming, kind and interesting, talking about her life and experiences, some of which we shared. She had a great sense of humour, and I always felt **a** calm, safe and warm comfort being with her ... even though she would soon let me know if she didn't like or agree with something. There was a similarity in this to the characteristics of my much-loved dogs for she could be as tenacious and feisty as a terrier and occasionally she might just nip you.

I admired that and her strength when coping with her increasing disabilities. There were difficult decisions like giving up the independence of the car and then her eyesight was failing, and she couldn't see it properly, so the TV had to go. Barbara always seemed very definite about her decisions and did not waste time looking back or complaining about her lot in life.

She loved St John's Church and was saddened when she couldn't manage the entrance steps which also prevented getting a wheelchair in. Happily, she was able to attend Christ the King Church and also St Marys in Wythall due to the kindness of one of the parishioners there.

I was always aware of Barbara's strong Christian faith which sustained and strengthened her. To me she was unique in that she would talk about it, share her thoughts and answer my questions, a mentor to me on my own sometimes very wobbly path!

She was a little lady with a big heart, I do miss her but she was one of life's gems who will sparkle in my memory forever."

The service ended with prayers around the tree planted in St John's garden in memory of Barbara.

WAY OF DISCIPLESHIP

WELCOME REVEREND WENDY MARTIN!

Hello, I'm Revd. Wendy Martin and it is wonderful for me to be joining the ministry team in Shirley Parish as a part-time, self-supporting, Associate Priest and I look forward to meeting you, worshipping with you and joining in with what God is doing in Shirley. I am dyslexic and find remembering names difficult, so please don't be offended if it takes me a while to remember yours!

I was born in Surrey and greatly enjoyed a 36 year career as a nurse, midwife and midwife lecturer, in London, Hertfordshire, Surrey and Sussex. At 24 years I spent 6 months in Israel caring for a new-born infant in a high-profile family. This enabled me to travel within Israel, New York and Egypt and participate in an archaeological dig in the Golan Heights afterwards - all formative experiences.

I attended Church of England schools and chose to be baptised and confirmed aged 13. I was brought up in a non-churchgoing, single-parent family with three sisters, and fell away from church attendance as a teenager. I returned, aged 28, as a result of a warm welcome when seeking marriage in a Methodist Church. I began to learn to follow Jesus by listening to sermons, being part of a Home Group and helping to run the church crèche. After 10 years, as a result of attending a Christianity Explored course, I understood more fully who Jesus was, what He had done for me on the Cross, and made a deeper commitment to follow Him. I began to pray and read the Bible more. I felt very inadequate when, within a year, I felt Jesus, calling me to preach and 'shepherd his people'.

I began the long journey, for me, towards ordained ministry, as a Methodist Local Preacher.

Now, 24 years later, while life has been very tough at God has been times, faithful and 'an everpresent help in times of trouble'. God has encouraged, sustained, healed and provided for me, and my family, through much adversity. For this,



I am eternally thankful. I have learned much about different Christian spiritualities and churchmanship's and have trained to be a Spiritual Accompanier.

I am an Associate of the Iona Community and try to live within a Rule of Life which includes simplicity, sustainability and contemplative prayer.

I am passionate about helping others come to know Jesus for themselves, helping to develop their faith and sharing the abundant love God has for *all* people. I am also passionate that our churches should be welcoming and accessible places for all, whatever their background, gender identity, dis/ability, ethnicity and sexuality. Following a call to Birmingham, I have been here 10 years now, and live in Ward End, not far from Heartlands Hospital. I was ordained Deacon in 2019, priest in 2020, and served my curacy in Garretts Green. My two sons live in West Sussex, and this October, I will become a Grandma for the first time! I enjoy my self-employed work as a Companion to Older People very much, and for relaxation, my interests include, exploring new places, researching my family history and making greeting cards.



from Gill Hanton (07973 942145) or the Parish Office As a parish we have been 'opening the book' with schools for a number of years.

Originally at Dickens Heath, and more recently with Widney and Kingswood schools. Open the Book is a nationally recognised scheme for telling the major stories of the Bible to primary school children. Which makes it sound rather dry and boring. Which it isn't.



We use the storyteller Bible along with a handbook

which gives us introductions and closing prayers to enable the stories to be put into context. The stories themselves often include dialogue and we tell them with one member of the team acting as narrator and other taking the individual parts. Costumes are a basic robe each although we may add angel wings, crowns etc. as appropriate.

Often some of the children can be included in the action, and there is never a shortage of volunteers even before they know what we want them to do. This year we have had two firsts, first ever outdoor Open the Book, and first ever getting the children to join in the dialogue from strategic crib cards.

Although we try to do the same story with both schools in each week the two experiences can be very different. At Widney there are 60 year 3 children in the school hall, and with Kingswood a much smaller number of reception age children come into church. Whichever, our Open the Book team find it very rewarding. The children all enjoy the stories and there are some special moments like the day when one of the children from Kingswood described the Bible as 'like a library'. The Kingswood children often give us a sneak preview of songs they are doing for Christmas or the end of term. A few years ago the team were invited to a dress rehearsal of the Widney school production of Joseph and the Amazing Technicolour Dreamcoat.

There are currently six members of the team, some do one day, some the other and some both. If you think you might be interested in joining the team please speak to Sarah Penfold.

very friendly and welcoming and are even there if I need a chat. I look forward to Fridays just as much as Ellie does ... we think you're all wonderful'. Gill is a grandma, who has been to us with three of her grandchildren over the last seven years. The last one was Izzy, but unfortunately, she is now moving on to school. She said ' ... they have all enjoyed it, will be sad to be saying goodbye to you all'. We will miss them so much - they have been so supportive and kind and of course the children have been a delight to know.

This academic year was our first one back since Covid lockdowns. We opened up last September with our new improved Church House garden, which has been used so much, due to the lovely weather. The carers and children started to arrive.

CHURCH HOUSE REFURBISHMENT

Back in March, we were awarded a grant from Veolia, through the Landfill Communities Trust scheme, which is an arrangement whereby community projects within 15 miles of a landfill site can request a grant from the waste company, who then set their donation against tax.

We were awarded a very generous grant of £25,425 to upgrade the infrastructure of our building with

- Loft insulation
- Upgrade of wiring
- LED lighting
- An alarm in the disabled toilet
- New emergency lighting
- New heating with infra-red electric panels on the ceilings (our gas boiler is 40 years old and on its last legs)
- Some redecoration (kitchen and lobbies to start with).

The Landfill Communities Fund requires a 10% payment from a partner organisation because they only get a 90% reduction in tax. The Friends of St James have provided this and been very supportive with all the paperwork.

Over the spring and summer, we have gone out to tender for the work and will be ready to start on 22nd August. The main work will take about three weeks and Church House will be closed for that period (until 10th September).

As well as providing much needed modern heating and lighting, the project aims to reduce the carbon footprint of the building. While scoping the work, we realised that there are a number of cold spots in the hall which would also benefit from insulation. I have applied for further grants for this and hope that we can do this in the future. One day, we might even have solar panels to help power our heating! This is all about thinking ahead.

We may need to fundraise for some 'little extras'. Jimmy Tots would like a display board, it would also be good to have a whiteboard between the hatches in the kitchen for menus and other activities and we will be making the most of having electricians on site to add wiring for a defibrillator which is planned to be sited on the front wall of Church House later in the year.

This feels quite a big undertaking - but very exciting and in keeping with the great sense of hope and purpose in our community as we move on after Covid.

HAVE YOU HEARD THE ONE ABOUT THE BIKERS WHO CAME TO OUR WELCOME CAFÉ?

It's true, one Tuesday in July half a dozen guys parked their bikes outside Church House and came in for coffee and cake. It was great to see them; they were made very welcome and had an enjoyable time.

But bikers are nothing new to St James – there are memorials to two racing motorcyclists in the churchyard (and the guys who came to the café knew all about them).

Just over the wall from Stratford Road close to the bus stop is a memorial to Rem Fowler.

Harry Rembrandt 'Rem' Fowler (1882 - 1963 in Birmingham, England) was a British motorcycle racer famous for winning the twin-cylinder class of the inaugural 1907 Isle of Man TT races.



A skilled toolmaker by trade, Rem competed as a

trials rider between 1903 and 1923 and entered the first Isle of Man TT race riding a Norton motorcycle.



However, Rem had a tough time winning the race. At one stage he'd had so many problems changing tyres, plugs and belts that he decided to call it a day. It was only when a spectator told him that he was leading by half an hour that he decided to continue and went on to win at a speed of 42.91mph.

On the other side of the churchyard near the school is a memorial to Freddie Hicks.

Frederick George Hicks won the 1929 Junior Isle of Man TT race in record time.

A couple of years later, after much success elsewhere, he was among the most experienced riders who participated in the 1931 Isle of Man Senior TT race, held that year on the last day of the programme, Friday 19th June. Earlier in the week he had competed in the Junior TT, suffering mechanical failure on his third lap, whilst being in third place.

That Friday, the course was treacherous because of early morning heavy rains, but when the six-lap Senior TT started, roads began to dry. After breaking the lap record,



at 77.46 mph on his second lap, Freddie was lying in fourth place at the start of his fifth lap. Making his way through the Mountain Circuit, he lost control of his machine two miles from Douglas and crashed into the doorway of the Central Stores, a shop in the village of Union Mills. He was killed instantly aged only 30.

KINGFISHER OR WOW MOMENTS

Way back in June I went to a conference for the clergy of the Diocese. Former Archbishop Rowan Williams was speaking, amongst other things, about looking out for the presence of God in our daily lives. Keeping alert for moments where we see him – in other people, in the natural world, in the way events just hold together. He used an illustration that has stuck with me.

Imagine walking alongside a stream. You are alert and aware of what's going on around you. Listening to the babbling of the stream and the birds singing, watching the leaves and branches in the breeze, smelling the flowers and plants on the bank. And you notice the flash of blue as a kingfisher darts past. There for a second and gone again. Wow.



You have not been looking for a kingfisher, but you have been aware of what's all around you and you notice it. A wow moment. Or perhaps we should rename it as a kingfisher moment. If you had not been looking around the moment would have gone unnoticed.

Since then in our Sunday services at St James (and occasionally in St John's and Christ the King) we have taken a moment in our worship to think about those wow moments, those kingfisher moments, those times when we have seen God in our lives. Some people have been brave enough to share those moments with the whole church.

It has been wonderful to hear of things that people have noticed – some seemingly ordinary things – plants growing in the garden for example – and some truly remarkable experiences of God's presence. But what has been equally wonderful is the buzz of chatter that there is as we share the moments with those around us. It seems there is so much to share!

Noticing God in our lives like this helps us to be encouraged by our own experiences and also by what others experience. It deepens our faith and helps us to realise that we don't leave God behind in church at the end of the Sunday service – he is alongside us every moment of every day. We just need to look out for him!

KNOWING AND LOVING OUR BODIES

After being diagnosed with Stage IV cancer, theologian and author Kate Bowler worked intensively to know and love her body and its ways of both serving and failing her. As part of her spiritual practice, she wrote this letter:

Dear Body

Sometimes, I hate you. You ache. You get tired sooner than I'd like to admit. You wake me in the night for no good reason. Your cells duplicate at unpredictable rates. New grey hairs and fine lines and silver stretch marks show up out of nowhere. You let me down just when I need you the most ...

Sometimes, I want a break from living with you. I'd prefer to trade you in for a newer model. A model that isn't in constant pain, that fits better in that pair of jeans, that has more energy. With you, I am limited - bound by skin and bone and thinning hair.

With you, I am fragile ...

But God knows what it's like to live in flesh ... If God too lived in a body, then God knows the ache of growing pains and the feeling of goosebumps on a brisk day and the comfort of a warm embrace. He felt the gurgle of a hungry stomach and the annoying prick of a splinter after a day of hard work. He wept over the death of a friend. Ours is a God who sneezed and rubbed His eyes when He was sleepy. Ours is a God who knew longing, heartbreak, excitement, frustration - the full range of what it means to be human ... [and] live in a body.

So when my own body drags me down, when my muscles ache, when my worries keep me up at night, when my fear for the future leaves me motionless, when I feel lonely and exhausted and burdened, I do not worship a God who is far off.

This is a God who knows my humanity inside and out. God has counted every hair on my head (Matthew 10:30) and bottled up every tear I have shed (Psalm 56:8). Not simply because the Word formed us (Genesis 1:27), knit us together in our mothers' wombs (Psalm 139:13), was there from the very beginning ... but because God wore our skin.

By embracing the wisdom of the incarnation, Bowler learned to listen to her body's messages and be kind to herself.

Hose pipe ban or not, we need to save water. Let's get into the habit of saving it little by little so that this necessary resource, provided by God for our use, is never wasted.

On average each one of us uses 142 litres of water each day; that's 250 pints, which is 31 gallons. We may think that our efforts aren't going to make much difference, but there are millions of us in this country and together we can make a huge difference.

Tips for saving water ...

1 Keep a bucket in the shower. Direct the cold water that you run off before the warm comes through into a bucket and use for watering the garden, rinsing dishes in the sink, flushing the loo - please let the Eco group know of any other uses that you think of.

2 Don't rinse fruit and vegetables under a running tap, use a bowl and reuse that water in the garden.

3 Take shorter showers.

4 If you have a dishwasher ensure that it is full before use. It is more eco friendly to run a dishwasher once a day than to wash up by hand three times.

5 If you like cold drinks keep a jug of water in the fridge, don't run the tap until it comes out cold.


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SHIRLEY PARISH BOOK CLUB - WHERE WE ARE NOW

WHY ... ASK THE SAINTS TO PRAY FOR US?

All Christians are united to each other because they are united to Jesus Christ through Baptism.

The relationship between Christians does not end with death. Christians believe in life after death. It is said that the Church is like an iceberg, mostly out of sight. (Hopefully it is not cold – but warm and friendly).

Three ways to think about the Church

a) The Church is 'visible' here on earth

It is sometimes called 'the Church Militant'. The work of the Church is (to worship God and) to extend the Kingdom of God on earth.

b) The Church Expectant

When we die, few are ready to go straight to Heaven. We usually need to be purified and cleansed of our sins. By far the largest part of the Church is unseen.

c) The Church Triumphant

This is those who have reached the Heavenly City, called the New Jerusalem.

It is helpful to remember the words of Jesus: 'In my Father's house there are many dwelling places' (John Chapter 14 verse 2). We exist in time and space, but time does not exist in heaven. 'A thousand years in thy sight are but as yesterday.' (Psalm 90 verse 4).

Who is a Saint?

First, we must mention St Mary and the Apostles. Then there are the Martyrs whose blood was shed because of their faith in Jesus Christ. The Letter to the Hebrews says: *'Since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses'*.

They include those officially recognised by the Church on earth as Saints. Then there are other Saints whose faith is known only to God. They are 'holy'. They have discovered the love of God in Jesus, and they are in heaven.

St Paul begins three of his letters 'to all the Saints' – at Ephesus, Philippi and Colossae. In other words, St Paul is using the word 'saint' for all living Christians.

What is a Patron Saint?

One answer might be – one who guards and guides us. England has St George as it's Patron Saint; Scotland has St Andrew, Wales has St David and Ireland has St Patrick. Churches have their own Saint. Many are dedicated with the name of St Mary.

Some Christians have their own Patron Saint. It may be a name given at Baptism, or a name officially added at Confirmation. Some adopt a Saint of their choice. It is good to get to know your personal Saint and ask him or her to pray for you. Perhaps the most widely used prayer is the Hail Mary, asking Mary: *'Hail Mary ... Holy Mary, Mother of God, pray for us sinners, now and at the hour of our death. Amen'*.

What is the Communion of Saints?

In the Creed (statement of our beliefs) Christians say: 'I believe in the Communion of Saints'. Communion means 'sharing' and 'fellowship'. The Saints in Heaven are close to God. They are close to us here on earth. There is only a thin layer which separates life on earth and life in the spiritual world.

There seems to be a network of prayer in the unseen spiritual world. The Saints praise God in Heaven, but they also pray for us here on earth. They are cheering and encouraging us on our pilgrimage until we reach the Heavenly City.

Why do we ask the Saints to pray for us?

It is a natural thing to do. The Saints in Heaven have a better understanding of prayer than we do here on earth. They are not affected by the things which distract us on earth. The prayers of faithful pastors on earth are powerful. How much more powerful are the prayers of the Saints in Heaven.

The Will of God and the prayers of the Saints

Jesus taught us to seek the will of God in our prayers: '*Thy will be done on earth, as it is in Heaven*'. When we ask the Saints to pray for us, it is still about seeking God's will. In our prayers, we are always seeking this, and not our own wishes.

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



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
