THE BIBLE RECIPE

On a very wet Saturday early in November a group of us met at St John's Church with Paul and Kate Day in order to have our understanding of the Bible gently expanded. We were all from the Shirley Parish and each of the three churches was represented.

All of us know isolated stories from the Old, and particularly, the New Testament, but we all had to admit that our Old Testament knowledge is at best patchy and, although we are aware that elements in the Old Testament are echoed in Matthew, Mark, Luke and John, we do not really know how all these various parts of the Bible knit together.

What we began to see on this Saturday morning was that the Old and New Testaments are intricate and linked parts of the same story. A story about God's relationship with us, as well as about the lives of all those people whose stories we meet in the Bible. We started to recognise something most of us had not really encountered before — that there are threads of meaning that weave themselves through almost all the stories. The Bible echoes across its different parts and across time.

We looked at how, like the shelves in a library, the books of the Bible might fall into different groups. In broad terms, the Old Testament explores church law, history, poetry, major and minor prophets, and the New Testament gives us the four gospels, church history, letters and ends with prophecy.

We traced a timeline from the Creation to Revelations and with this began to understand, firstly, the context in which the Bible stories were written but perhaps as much as that, we were secondly helped to catch hold of the truths which link the various parts of the Bible to each other — to find the timeless meanings that begin to emerge when we look at all the books of the Bible together.

It was a stimulating, a revealing and an extremely enjoyable beginning to the growth of our understanding.



Perhaps you might enjoy, as we did, a fresh encounter with the Bible through this game? All you have to do is look up each of the following references and identify the ingredients which might add up to making a 'Bible cake':

I would also like to take this opportunity to wish you all a very Happy Christmas and best wishes for the coming year as we look forward to seeing God at work in what we do in and around the Parish.






MOTHERS' UNION NEWS



FOOD BANK NEWS

After the generous gifts received from Harvest collections, we have been busy dating and sorting, as well as making up food parcels. New shelving has been installed in the warehouse, increasing the space available for storage and making it easier to ensure items are used in date order.

We are delighted to say that our requests for particular items are so often met with donations of those items. All donations are always welcome, but it is surprising how some foodstuffs seem to be in plentiful supply and then just dry up, and specific requests really do mirror specific needs at any given time.

With the winter and the bad weather drawing on we are hoping that the Christmas donations are generous, as if you are hungry you also feel the cold more. Basic foodstuffs are always needed, in particular dried milk, tinned fruit and vegetables, instant mashed potato, rice pudding, steamed puddings, crispbreads and cooking oil. Small sizes of cereal and sugar are helpful, as the large packets are too much for one or two people and we can double up if necessary, also instant custard mix, which does not require milk and is so much easier to carry than a tin. It is somewhat of a quandary for donors at this time of year whether to give staples such as those listed, or whether to give something more seasonal; we always get a good supply of mince pies but these and Christmas puddings need to be chosen with care as many contain alcohol and nuts, which make them unsuitable for many potential recipients. However, it is lovely to have sweets or chocolates, crisps and nibbles to put in the parcels, particularly for families, in addition to the basics that are always included.


The Christmas advertisements have started on television and in the supermarkets, and most seem to suggest that what will make your Christmas the best ever is vast quantities of food and drink. You have to feel sorry for the Cratchits in 'A Christmas Carol' – the Christmas dinner Scrooge provided for them did not include canapés, Prosecco, smoked salmon starters, a choice of puddings and enough chocolates to give Tiny Tim and his siblings a serious stomach ache! However, for anyone struggling to feed themselves and their families, this emphasis on overindulgence must make their situation even more difficult. We keep asking you for your support and your response is always generous – we are so grateful for all your donations, but not as grateful as the recipients.

THE ADAVU CHRISTMAS PARTY

The Adavu Party WILL happen ... with a little help from our friends.

As I write, parishioners are buying gifts for clients of the Food Bank and the Adavu Trust. These are very practical items, socks, underwear, nightwear, toiletries, snacks ... and some festive treats for the children.

The Christmas party is a highlight in the Adavu year. (If anyone has not heard of this Charity, it offers support to victims of modern slavery and is an



initiative of the Methodist Church.) The party provides families with a cooked meal, games and Christmas gifts and is a wonderful opportunity for clients, who are supported individually by project workers, to get together and make friends.

Some weeks ago, Elizabeth Paice learned that funding for the venue and hot meal was not available this year. Elizabeth and her friends normally donate the dessert in the form of cakes (with some to take home) but there was still a shortfall of £450 compared to the costs of last year's party, which the hard-pressed charity could not fund.



Never daunted, Elizabeth secured some donations and negotiated a reduction in costs until only £125 remained to be found. This has been donated by the Shirley Lions and we are very grateful for their help in saving the day. Truly a community effort!

So now, on 19th December, there will be gifts from parishioners, party fun and a festive meal in a warm, welcoming setting. Happy Christmas!

ECO CHURCH, ECO CHRISTIANS

Our three congregations have each looked at the Eco-Church baseline questionnaire with its five sections, worship, buildings, land, community engagement and individual lifestyle. We are ready to start the official scheme at bronze level, which confirms my long-held view that Shirley Parish is already a thoughtful, caring community.

We score highly in regard to worship and teaching, suggesting that we recognise the issues and care about them, but we do have a way to go to put our ideals into practice.

The first four areas for reflection and action are for our collective (Eco-Church) effort. The lifestyle section invites us to consider what we can do as individuals to cherish and protect our environment.

There are many reasons for trying to engage with this.

- As Christians, we believe that our world is the gift of a loving Creator, ours to enjoy and protect - but as stewards, not owners.
- Even without such convictions, we are all increasingly aware of the fragility of the environment and that there is no Planet B!
- All around us we find beauty and diversity in landscape, sky, sea, weather, seasons, plant and animal life. These sustain us but also give us joy and deserve our protection.
- We all have young people we care about, children, grandchildren, nieces, nephews, godchildren. Protecting their future is our solemn duty.

It is easy to be daunted by the scale of the problem and feel that only the powerful can make a difference, but individual choices and lifestyles are a vital part of any solution.

Many in our church family are from a generation which hates waste so I would think there is already a spirit of thrift in our personal use of energy, food and goods. Can we go a step further and try to follow the LOAF principle when buying our food (Locally sourced, Organic, Animal-friendly, Fairtrade)?

This site lets you calculate the effects of air travel, other transport, home energy consumption and diet. The shock to me was that as a regular, moderate meat-eater the impact on CO2 output of my food choices was more than my car and train use. It is definitely time for me to re-think menus a bit! The point of the exercise is to find ways of reducing your carbon footprint - or even offsetting it by donating to charities which protect the environment.

I'm on a steep learning curve. If anyone wants to think about this with me, we could get together a small focus group and look at how we might move from bronze to gold ... or even beyond!




'NAME THE LAMB' COMPETITION




From December 3rd until our Christmas Tree Festival a number of shops on Stratford Road will have lambs in their windows.



FOR TO US A CHILD IS BORN

'For to us a child is born, to us a son is given, and the government will be on his shoulders. And he will be called Wonderful Counsellor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.' (Isaiah Chapter 9 verse 6)

Approaching Christmas, we are very aware of the political and economic uncertainties that face us. The prophet Isaiah also lived in such uncertain times, as the Assyrians had just conquered the northern kingdom of Israel (734-732 BC). This fulfilled Isaiah's warnings to the people, who had turned their back on God and His ways. However, Isaiah is able to bring a word of hope, promising a Messiah who would come like a great light: 'The people walking in darkness have seen a great light' (Isaiah 9:2). These words are fulfilled in the birth of Jesus 700 years later and describe person of Jesus:



Wonderful Counsellor: He will give us the wisdom we need, especially when we have difficult decisions to make at work or home, or in dealing with our finances or future direction.

Mighty God: He will provide the help and strength to face a difficult diagnosis, family crisis or relationships breakdown, as we trust His plan and purpose for our lives.

Everlasting Father: He cares for us as a father cares for His children, so that we can come to Him when we feel alone or we are really struggling, knowing that He hears and will answer our prayers.

Prince of Peace: He has secured peace by His cross and resurrection, and so we can find in Him true acceptance, forgiveness and peace for our lives, relationships and future.

Christmas is the time to celebrate a God who is faithful to all His promises, 'the zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this' (verse 7)

Over two years the congregation worked to re-decorate, repair the lighting, re-carpet and more to return this prayer space to use. They then wanted to open the chapel to the local community.

Joining the Small Pilgrim Places Network has helped the congregation open the church more to those who pass by.

A Small Pilgrim Places Network (SPPN) place is a space for keeping silence, encouraging prayer and making a space in a busy world. At St Michael's the SPPN space is used by those who come as a place to stop and be with God. Families stop by after a stay and play group, busy people who work on a Sunday come to sit and pray. Those who just need a few minutes to themselves come as well.

There are SPPN places throughout the country, St Michael's is pleased to be the first in Birmingham. SPPN fulfil their purpose of making space, keeping silence, encouraging solitude, and providing simple focus points in its own way. They have a respected identity of their own, unique and singular - with their own history, character and atmosphere, communicating something of the 'eternal now', while also bringing the past into the present day and pointing towards the future. Some might describe them as holy or sacred. Celts sometimes described them as 'thin' places.

St Michael's Church was opened in June 1971 as the first purpose built Anglican Methodist Church in the UK. The worship space is a hexagonal shape which is reflected across the site. The side Chapel, which is their Small Pilgrim Place is a unique prayer room — used by local people who wish to sit in a quite prayerful space in the midst of a busy outer housing estate.

St Michael's Chapel is open during the day in term time and visitors are welcome.



CHRISTMAS WORDSEARCH






