

We thank him hugely from our hearts for all the work that he did during the time of Covid for all the people of the parish. From there we have grown and flourished.

We remember also the work that he has done on behalf of the community, always welcoming the stranger into the church. So a big 'thank you' to Paul, you will be remembered for your open door policy.

We welcomed Dr Kate Crocker to our September meeting for her PowerPoint talk on 'Life as a G.P.'

For as long as Kate could remember she always wanted to be a doctor, and this was nurtured by her maternal and paternal grandmothers. Both her grandmothers were hardworking people from Bloxwich who were actively involved within their local community. One of her grandmothers kept a book of remedies and treatments and Kate holds happy memories of reading this book. Her father was also very keen on education, both she and her sister received tremendous encouragement from him.

On leaving school Kate trained at Girton College, Cambridge and St Mary's, London and then back to Cambridge for her finals. Kate started her general practice as a locum in Studley before moving to Solihull/Heartlands to specialise in paediatrics and into general practice in Birmingham. Besides paediatrics she has other special interests including diabetes and respiratory medicine. After 41 years Kate took the decision to hang up her stethoscope due to increasing family commitments. She continued to do locum cover in retirement and then Covid vaccinations.

During Kate's time, surgery life was vastly different from today — there was no appointment system just long patient waits in the waiting room, no nurses, no consultation by telephone and nighttime call outs, a distant memory.

Kate spoke with such passion and love of a totally fulfilled career, thank you for the fascinating insight.

Throughout her career Kate's faith has always sustained her. Kate is the Deputy Warden for St James; a very time-consuming role, always with a smile on her face.

Three new MU members Dorothy Needle, Pauline Pederson and Peggy Eden were enrolled by Rev Wendy Carter into our branch, a warm welcome to them.

Our next meeting on the 1st October will be Mary Bodfish for a talk on 'Lest We Forget'.

Visitors are always welcome.



FOODBANK APPEAL

Hello, everyone.

I know that I wrote a "Farewell" letter when David and I decided to retire from most of our activities with the charities which we have helped with your superb support for many years.

However, recently we had cause to visit the warehouse where the food bags are prepared for distribution to the Food Banks.

We were horrified and very alarmed to see how low the stocks of food are currently. Where we would have expected the central floor of the warehouse to have pallets of tins and packets waiting to be dated and sorted - there were NONE! The situation is so bad that it is hard even to fill the bags to the very basic lists which are suggested for each individual/family.

The two problems are;

- 1. Donations are down
- 2. the requests for help are going up

The shortages seemed to be across the board whether it be tinned meat, fish, fruit, tea, coffee, soups - everything.

Hopefully, there will be a very slight increase in donations this month when Harvest Festivals usually bring in extra supplies, but that will only be a very temporary help. What we really need to do is to spread the word about how dire the situation has become and ask folks to increase/resume their donations.

If I were pushed to guess at the reasons for the increase in requests for food parcels, I would suggest both the increase in rents because of the dearth of housing, and the chronic shortage of jobs for those desperate to work.

Do you remember when we used the slogan" Every tin counts" - perhaps we could use that again?

LESS IS BEST

My husband will tell you that I have a wardrobe bulging with clothes but can never find anything suitable to wear - shame on me!

The following quote, from Patrick Grant, Savile Row tailor and presenter of "The Sewing Bee", shocked me:

"We have enough clothing on the planet right now to clothe the next six generations of the human race."

So what sort of carbon footprint am I leaving on the planet? It's not something I have given much thought to in the past - but being an avid fan of BBC's programme, "The Sewing Bee", I became aware of presenter Patrick Grant's mission to educate us about fabric quality, about how much we use and about how we should re-use fabric. And in Shirley Parish, we are doing well to make fabric carrier bags for the Foodbank out of pre-loved fabrics, thus cutting down on the use of plastic bags - so two ways of reducing our collective carbon footprint.

Patrick Grant's book, "Less..." recommends having a few good quality items to wear until they wear out rather than many cheaper ones that will be frequently replaced and made from fabrics that will be harmful to the planet. In an online video on sustainable fabrics, he encourages us to look at the labels to see what the fabrics are made of, whether from new or, preferably, from charity shops. Every fabric deserves to be reused and he lists the most earth-friendly as -

Linen - the best of all Cotton - but needs a lot of water to grow Wool Viscose - which biodegrades well.

And even when we buy from a charity shop (recycled), is what we buy recyclable?

Food for thought indeed. And do come to the Green Fair on 4th October to understand more about carbon footprint ... and much more.

On Wednesday 10th September, I had the joy of visiting Tudor Grange Primary St James Academy, our church school, to join the new principal, Mrs Duxbury, in commissioning this year's chaplaincy team. These Year 5 pupils take on a range of responsibilities throughout the school year: writing prayers for Collective Worship, setting out benches and chairs for assemblies, operating the computer, and sometimes mopping up the water I knock over on the stage. Also, they help plan end-of-half-term services which include prayers they've written themselves and music they've chosen with great enthusiasm and wisdom.

Each pupil who joins the team writes a letter to the principal explaining why they want to serve and what they believe the role involves. Their thoughtfulness and sincerity are always striking.

This year, eight children were commissioned with the following words:

Loving God, thank you for [children's names] and their call to serve as chaplains in our school. I commission you as the new chaplaincy team for this year. May you be brave like Saint James, faithful in prayer and joyful in love. May you have wisdom to listen, courage to challenge kindly, and hearts that shine with light. Bless your journey as you help others to grow in faith.

Please do keep the St James chaplaincy team in your prayers. I hope we'll welcome them to one of our church services during their time in post.

We give thanks to God for the deep and joyful connection we share with our local schools. Through chaplaincy, worship, and shared moments of learning, we glimpse the Kingdom of God growing among us—in curiosity, kindness, and the courage of young hearts.

BLACK HISTORY MONTH

October invites us to honour the stories, struggles, and triumphs of Black communities across the UK and beyond. This year marks 60 years since the Race Relations Act - a landmark moment in the journey toward justice and equality. We remember those who stood firm: activists, parents, pastors, and pioneers who challenged injustice and shaped a more compassionate society.

As a Church, we are called to be part of that legacy. The Bible reminds us that "there is no longer Jew or Greek ... for all are one in Christ Jesus" (Galatians 3:28). Black History Month is not only about remembrance - it's a call to action. A call to listen, to learn, and to stand alongside those whose voices have too often been silenced.

The roots of Black History Month lie in the United States, where Harvard-trained historian Carter G. Woodson founded the Association for the Study of Negro Life and History in 1915 to promote scholarly research into Black history. In 1926, Woodson launched 'History Week' in February, dedicating a week to celebrate the achievements of African Americans in schools and communities. Amid the Civil Rights Movement, this observance expanded into a month-long celebration, culminating in President Gerald Ford officially recognising 'Black History Month' in February 1976, calling Americans to honour contributions of Black citizens to the nation's history.

A decade later, community activists brought the concept to the UK. In October 1987, eighteen months after the abolition of the Greater London Council, figures such as Ansell Wong of the London Strategic Policy Unit and Lambeth Council leader Linda Bellos partnered with ethnic minority groups to inaugurate Britain's first Black History Month. The launch at the Commonwealth Institute featured guests like Sally Mugabe, and the choice of October allowed organisers to distinguish the UK observance from the American one, anchoring it to local calendars and seasonal rhythms.

Ghanaian activist Akyaaba Addai-Sebo, who arrived in the UK in 1984, played a pivotal role in co-ordinating the inaugural 1987 events across London boroughs. His work, alongside grassroots organisations, helped establish Black History Month as an annual fixture, empowering communities to reflect on the legacies of colonialism, the Windrush generation, and ongoing struggles for racial justice. Through seminars, exhibitions, and performances, Addai-Sebo's vision ensured that Black history would remain a living, evolving conversation in British public life.

Since its inception, Black History Month has migrated beyond London to cities and towns nationwide, embraced by schools, museums, workplaces, faith communities, and cultural institutions. Each October's annual theme - this year, "Standing Firm in Power and Pride" - invites fresh exploration of historical narratives and contemporary issues. As participants engage with talks, art installations, and community projects, they continue to write new chapters in the story of Black Britain, deepening our collective journey toward equality and inclusion.

31st OCTOBER - ALL HALLOWS EVE - OR HOLY EVENING

Modern Halloween celebrations have their roots with the Celtic peoples of pre-Christian times.

In those long-ago days, on the last night of October, the Celts celebrated the Festival of Samhain, or 'Summer's End'. The priests, or Druids, performed ceremonies to thank and honour the sun. For there was a very dark side to all this: Samhain also signalled the onset of winter, a time when it was feared that unfriendly ghosts, nature-spirits, and witches roamed the earth, creating mischief. So the Druid priests lit great bonfires and performed magic rites to ward off or appease these dark supernatural powers.

Then the Romans arrived, and brought their Harvest Festival which honoured the Goddess Pomona with gifts of apples and nuts. The two festivals slowly merged.

When Christianity arrived still later, it began to replace the Roman and Druid religions. 1st November - All Saints' Day - was dedicated to all Christian Martyrs and Saints who had died. It was called 'All Hallows' Day'. The evening before became an evening of prayer and preparation and was called 'All Hallows' Eve', The Holy Evening, later shortened to 'Halloween'.

For many centuries, however, fear of the supernatural remained strong. During the Middle Ages, animal costumes and frightening masks were worn to ward off the evil spirits of darkness on Halloween. Magic words and charms were used to keep away bad luck, and everybody believed that witches ride about on broomsticks. Fortune telling was popular, and predicting the future by the use of nuts and apples was so popular that Halloween is still sometimes known as Nutcrack Night or Snap-Apple Night.

Today, Christians have learned to turn to prayer instead of charms to overcome the powers of darkness. And the deeper, true meaning of All Hallows' Eve, should not be forgotten. As Christians, we all draw closer to Christ when we remember and give thanks for our loved ones and for others who have gone before us through the gates of death.

THE FRIEND AT MIDNIGHT

As we remember St Luke this month, let's note that one of the major themes in his gospel is prayer. Jesus tells the *Parable of the Friend at Midnight* (Luke 11:5-8) in the context of teaching His disciples to pray (1).

Pray Shamelessly:

In the parable a man approaches his friend at midnight and asking: 'Friend, lend me three loaves, for a friend of mine has arrived on a journey, and I have nothing to set before him' (5-6). Despite the hour, the rules of hospitality mean that this is not an unreasonable request. Jesus says, 'though he will not get up and give him anything because he is his friend, yet because of the man's boldness he will rise and give him whatever he needs' (8). Jesus is telling us to approach our heavenly Father in 'shameless boldness' with our needs. As adopted children we should have no hesitancy in coming to talk with our Father. It is not God who is reluctant to answer, but we to ask. Do we pray with shameless boldness?

Pray Persistently:

Like children we should be persistent in our requests: 'Ask, and it will be given to you; seek, and you will find; knock, and it will be opened to you.' (9). All three verbs indicate a continual habit: 'Keep on asking...seeking...knocking'. We will not be content simply to ask once and then move on. Jesus tells us to bring our prayers to God persistently. Do we give up too easily in prayer?

Pray Expectantly:

'For everyone who asks receives, and the one who seeks finds, and to the one who knocks it will be opened.' (10). Are we expectant in our prayers, believing that God delights in meeting our requests?

Why not begin this adventure of prayer today!


