REMEMBERING QUEEN ELIZABETH II

The death of the Queen was an event that we all knew was coming and on one level we were all expecting. But as it was announced we were, I believe, all deeply shocked and saddened.

She was more than a monarch; more than a Head of State. She was a model of dedicated and selfless service; she was an example of faithful Christian living; she was kind, generous, wise and was able to see the funny side of life. She was loved by the whole nation. And not just our nation of course. Tributes poured in from around the world. Tributes not just to her as a Queen, but to her as a person; as a special person.

Back in 1952 her father King George VI had died and she – just a young woman at the time - was next in line for the throne. We can hardly dare to imagine what was going through her mind.

Grieving for her father, at the same time as anticipating this huge role she was about to take on as Head of State. Apprehensive, fearful even. She knew she could only fulfil the tasks before her with the help and power of God. She asked the nation in her first Christmas broadcast as Queen, prior to the coronation -

'Pray that God may give me wisdom and strength to carry out the solemn promises I shall be making, and that I may faithfully serve Him all the days of my life'.

Like countless millions across the ages she placed her life into the hands of God – taking Jesus as her example and her pattern and being strengthened by the Holy Spirit. Living a life of love and service, following in the footsteps of Jesus. Never afraid to acknowledge the power of God in her life.

I am sad today. But I am not sad for the Queen. I know that she is now in the full presence of the God she served throughout her life. She is where she always had confidence she would be – fully present with God.

But I am sad for our loss. We have lost a great Head of State and a wonderful model of faith and life. And as we look back with thankfulness at her life; as we praise God for her example of love and service perhaps we also find ourselves looking forward with ... uncertainty perhaps; maybe even with concern. It is a new era. For me and I guess for many of us – the Queen is the only Head of State we have known. She has always been there.

In the House of Commons on the day after her death Liz Truss described the Queen as the rock on which modern Britain has been built.



REMEMBERING QUEEN ELIZABETH II continued

In the same debate Keir Starmer said

'When everything is spinning, a nation requires a still point, when times are difficult, it requires comfort, and when direction is hard to find, it requires leadership. The loss of our Queen robs this country of its stillest point, its greatest comfort, at precisely the time we need those things most'.

Its really not surprising we are uncertain and maybe more than a little concerned. For our nation and for ourselves.

But the Bible readings that we had on the Sunday after her death give us hope for our future. The God that was always alongside the Queen is still with us today and into the future.

In Lamentations we read — 'The steadfast love of the Lord never ceases; his mercies never come to an end; they are new every morning; great is your faithfulness'. (Lamentations Chapter 3 verses 22 and 23)

Although it may seem that the world is changing and that we are without the Queen who was, no doubt, that fixed point for us all, the scripture reassures us that God does not change. His love is constant; his mercies everlasting; he will never let us down.

The gospel reading makes a similar point. Jesus says

'I am the bread of life. Whoever comes to me will never be hungry, and whoever believes in me will never be thirsty'. (John Chapter 6 verse 35)

He assures us that he will always be with us, always sustain us, always be sufficient for us if we trust in him.

So as we look into what is in many ways an unknown future we can have confidence in the God who walked alongside the Queen, and who promises to walk alongside us. We can be encouraged that just as he never let her down, he will never let us down. And we can be sure that his love will always surround us and shine through us as it did for the Queen.

I finish these few thoughts by quoting from the Queen who said \dots

'I know how much I rely on my own faith to guide me through the good times and the bad. Each day is a new beginning, I know the only way to live my life is to try to do what is right, to take the long view, to give of my best in all that the day brings and to put my trust in God. I draw strength from the message of hope in the Christian gospel.'

May we likewise draw strength from our faith and from the Christian message of hope.

CHURCH HOUSE REFURBISHMENT

The first phase of work was completed in mid-September.

We now have new LED lighting and infra-red heating panels warming us from above. It may take a little while to get the heating adjusted! We need to economise on electricity, while keeping the building comfortable which will need careful programming. The loft has been insulated and we are reviewing and modernising our fire safety.



The lights in the toilets are operated by a sensor and will automatically turn off when no movement is detected so the light switches are no longer needed.

There is an alarm in the disabled toilet.

The LEDs which illuminate the final exits are now permanently on. This is required by fire regulations because of the way in which the building was originally wired. Please continue to switch off the room lights but remember that the building will still have faint light showing 24/7.

It would be good if everyone were to take a look at the Fire Safety advice on the notice board in the Hall. We will be having some formal training later in the year.

There is more insulation to be installed and then some decoration - as much as we can afford, then maybe a little more fundraising might be needed to finish the job!

We are very grateful to the Veolia Environmental Trust and the National Lottery Community Fund for their support with this project.

FOOD BANK NEWS

We often struggle to describe how great the needs of people now are, and what a lifeline foodbanks have become. So, on this occasion we would like to do it by sharing with you an extract from an article published in a recent Big Issue magazine, written by Earlsfield Foodbank Manager Charlotte White.

"...and we can only just about manage to put together food parcels because of a lack of donations. More worrying is the intensity, urgency and complexity of guests' situations – every week we see new levels of suffering and deprivation.

From the minute the doors opened at 9:30am there were new guests waiting to be registered, and we kept registering until the doors closed at midday.

FOOD BANK NEWS continued

Every story this week, without exception, was complex and heart-breaking. There were many issues relating to benefits: delayed payments; payments unexpectedly stopped or halted due to sanctions. And beyond benefits, problems relating to debt, domestic violence, employment and mental health.

While guests may have different reasons for needing the foodbank, the same phrases come up again and again: "I don't have any food at home"; "I have no money left until the end of the month"; "I haven't eaten". And all too often these chilling words: "I can't cope" and "I can't go on like this"...

..... Another new guest, Josie, is in tears — she had been woken up that morning by bailiffs knocking on the door. She works twelve hours a week for a supermarket, but the income barely makes a dent in her debt repayments. At the same time she's caring for her adult son with severe mental issues. She's asked for more support and has been told she and her son are "on a list".

Perhaps most heartbreaking of all is Marion, a single mother, who says she's at her lowest point. She lives in emergency accommodation with her two toddlers — just one small room for all of them. She was meant to be there for six weeks, but it has now been six months. She has no washing facilities and has to hand wash everything, including towels, which she can never get dry. The children are regularly ill. She hasn't eaten for over a day, making sure that her children can have the little food she can afford to buy...".

Shirley Parish food donations go to Sparkhill foodbank alongside donations from supermarkets and many other sources. But as everybody is having to tighten their belts at the moment; donations have dropped alongside continuing increases in demand for food. We have been told that at Sparkhill they are having to spend about £1,000 a week buying food to make up the shortfall.

So please give as much as you can. The most urgent needs are tinned meat, fish, vegetables, tomatoes, fruit, soup and long-life milk. The only things they don't need urgently at the moment are baked beans, pasta and rice.

Moving on to Nick's second choice a more serious piece Beethoven's Piano Concerto No 5 Finale. For Theresa's choice she specified a particular version of "Lead me Lord" by Samuel Sebastian Wesley that contained the words "Lead me into holiness" sung by Morristown Choir. To complete this round Wendy surprised us all with "All shook Up" by Elvis Presley - there was plenty of audience participation.

For our final round Nick chose Elgar's Cello Concerto Finale, Theresa's "Let it Be" by The Beatles and Wendy Beethoven's Fifth Symphony 3rd movement.

Finally, Ray asked them if they would be happy to remain on their own isolated island. Nick said that he would try to escape, Wendy would be quite content to wait for somebody to find her and Theresa knew that Dave would come looking for her.

Ray concluded by thanking Wendy, Theresa, and Nick for taking part and being our castaways and this was echoed by all present. Linda thanked Ray for all his time both on the evening and his preparation before the event and to Rev Paul for all his help and support in providing the technical backup, without Paul this evening would not have been possible.

The meeting ended with the closing music "By the Sleepy Lagoon" BBC version.

TROOP A I D

supporting our injured troops explained that Troop Aid was

At our September meeting we welcomed Pam Sutton and Kim Freeman from Troop Aid. Pam explained that Troop Aid was founded in November 2006 by

three ex-servicemen as a result of a visit to Selly Oak Hospital. At the time this was the home of the Defence Medical Welfare Services who were responsible for the welfare of all Armed Forces Personnel, male and female who were injured during the conflict in Afghanistan, Iraq and elsewhere. Now it is all administered from the Queen Elizabeth Hospital where injured service members receive the very best medical care. When service personnel are injured either on training exercise or in combat operations, they are often admitted to hospital without any of their personal effects or clothing. To preserve the dignity of the wounded service members on arrival at hospital Troop Aid provide them with one of their emergency GRAB BAGS. GRAB BAGS contain pen, socks, deodorant, underwear, t-shirt and shorts, towel and face flannel, shower mules, washing and shaving kit, toothpaste and toothbrush and a get-well card. The bags are adapted for male or female. In addition to the emergency bags, they also supply on demand other items of clothing and footwear such as tracksuits, hoodies, fleeces, and trainers.

GRAB BAGS are also sent out to injured service personnel in over twenty-four locations worldwide, one area is Medicine Hat in Alberta, Canada where the Army have a large training area.

Troop Aid is a registered charity and their funds come entirely from fund raising events and donations from organisations. They feel very privileged to have as their patron His Majesty King Charles III.

Our next meeting on the **5th of October** will be Barry Durman speaking on the Millennium Way Walks.

The short story has suffered critical neglect in Britain ... squeezed out somewhere in between the novels and poetry. (Frank Myszor)


Over the last few years, the Shirley Parish Book Club has read and talked about mostly novels, punctuated by the occasional work of non-fiction. A short while ago we offered to each other our favourite poetry — and now for the first time, (thanks to Sue Guy) we have looked at some short stories. By coincidence, a few weeks ago we needed to raise to funds to support some recently arrived children's summer swimming ambitions. So, we had a sponsored read. The short stories we were beginning to assemble fitted the bill perfectly. We raised £370. We needed about £100. So, after consultation with Paul Day and Solihull's co-ordinator for recent arrivals, we have joined Our Lady of the Wayside in a project to fund a Peak District holiday for twelve Ukrainian children. We gave £270.

The stories we read together proved a mixed bag — Victoria Hislop, Alan Bennett, JoJo Moyes, Edgar Allan Poe, Dick King Smith, Arnold Bennett, Jane Gardam, Helen Dunmore, Bill Naughton, and D.H. Lawrence. Most were raved about by Book Club members, others not so much. It seemed in our more recent discussion about the stories, it was *the form* rather than a particular writer's story that left some of us cold. Having done their duty, read the stories, raised the funds, several of the Book Club then shot off and lost themselves in more novels — by Edward Rutherford, James Patterson, Graham Swift, Robert Galbraith, Lisa Kidd, John Le Care, Ann Perry, Kristen Hannah, and Karen Harper.

The next novel for us all is: Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus. It's been in the best sellers' list for weeks now and several of the Book Club, once they got wind of this as our next Book Club choice, are already enjoying it.

This book will be discussed on **Thursday 13th October** at 2pm in Church House.

Then – advance warning – the meeting after that will be on Wednesday 7th December at 2pm in Church House. We are planning to put a Book Club Christmas tree (with a Christmas books theme) together in church on the same day and to discover our (secret) choice for the book after *Lessons in Chemistry*.

WHY ... ANOINT WITH OIL?

Oil is used in many ways: it makes wheels run smoothly; it is a source of energy and heating; artists use it to create beautiful paintings; it is used in cooking, and the manufacturing of many goods; Kings, Queens and Emperors are anointed with oil.

God uses ordinary things for his work

Bread and wine are consecrated to feed us with the Body and Blood of Christ in Holy Communion. Water washes away our sins and makes us members of His Church at Baptism, God uses three different oils to carry out his purposes. The oils are blessed by the Bishop, usually at a Chrism Mass on Holy (Maundy) Thursday.

The Anointing of the Sick

Jesus reached out to touch people with his healing hands. The Church reaches out in his name to continue his healing work. God wants disease to be conquered, and illness healed. He longs for people to be whole in body, mind and spirit.

Jesus handed down the Sacraments to the Church through the Apostles. These include the Anointing of the Sick with Oil.

Anointing was used in the Church from the beginning. St James wrote in his letter: 'Is any among you sick? Let him call for the elders (priests) of the Church, and let them pray over him, anointing him with oil in the name of the Lord, and the Lord will raise him up'. (James Chapter 5 verse 14).

The oil is used to make a small Cross on the forehead and palms of both hands. This is done at home, hospital or in a Church service.

The Laying on of Hands with prayer is part of the anointing. The priest (and sometimes an authorised lay person) place their hands on the head of the sick person, while praying over them. There may be a time of silence, with only a short prayer spoken aloud.

This Sacrament is also used for those who are dying, or before an operation. It is for spiritual as well as physical healing.

The forgiveness of sins can be part of the healing process. Those who are ill sometimes ask for God's forgiveness through a priest, who then pronounces the Absolution (God's forgiveness). Anything said to the priest in Confession is never revealed to anyone.

Oil used at Baptism

This is the Oil of Catechumens. The strange name comes from those who are learning the Catechism (the teaching of the Church) in preparation for Baptism.

The Holy Spirit came upon Jesus when he was baptised in the River Jordan by St John the Baptist. Christians are 'born of water and the Spirit' (John Chapter 3 verse 5). The Anointing with oil at Baptism is a sign that we have been 'sealed' with the Holy Spirit (Revelation Chapter 7 verse 3). The Oil of Chrism is often used at Baptism.

WHY ... ANOINT WITH OIL? continued

We have to be baptised before we can receive any of the other 'Sacraments'. These are Confirmation, Holy Communion, Marriage, Reconciliation, Anointing and Ordination.

Oil used at Confirmation

This is the Oil of Chrism. To receive Holy Communion, a person normally has to be confirmed. This involves the laying on of hands by the Bishop, with prayer. A small Cross is made with Oil on the forehead of each candidate.

Oil used at the Ordination of a Priest

The Oil of Chrism is used at the Ordination of a Deacon, and again one year later, when the deacon is ordained as a priest.



The New Testament has four gospels, twenty one epistles and the book of Revelation.

The **epistles** are a collection of **letters** that were written by the apostles to the early Christians, they contain teaching, instruction, advice and encouragement.


