

PRAYERS OF LOVE AND FAITH

Those of you with good memories will recall that last March I wrote a piece for this magazine about the "Living in Love and Faith" process - the Church of England's discussion process regarding questions of identity, sexuality, relationships and marriage that has been ongoing for the last couple of years.

Up until very recently the situation has been that Church of England clergy have not been permitted to marry same sex couples, nor to conduct services of blessings for same sex relationships.

The Bishops have now issued some prayers to ask for God's blessing on people who are in long term stable same sex relationships. These prayers may only be used in the context of regular public worship - currently there is no provision for a "stand alone" service of blessing which might, in some ways, resemble a marriage service.

The guidance issued by the Bishops is that use of these prayers of blessing be at the discretion of the Vicar, though there is a recommendation that the PCC (Church Council) be consulted. Our PCC discussed this at our meeting in January and are happy that such prayers be offered in the churches of Shirley Parish. I am more than happy to use the prayers, as are my colleagues Richard Haynes and Wendy Martin.

The Bishops have suggested that Parishes consider a policy for offering such prayers, and our Mission, Ministry and Pastoral Committee have since looked at this. It was their recommendation that we offer these prayers to anyone subject to the approval of the Vicar. The context of the prayers will be in a regular act of worship, so one of the matters I will take into account in reaching a decision would be how well the couple are known to us.

I am delighted that we can offer this welcome to those in same sex relationships and look forward to the day when we can offer more. However, I recognise that there may be some in Shirley Parish who hold alternative views and I would be more than happy to have conversations with you should you wish.

PLASTIC WASTE

Just over a century ago we started to make plastic; it revolutionised medicine with life-saving equipment, led to the space race, greatly reduced the weight of cars and aircraft, which saved fuel and pollution, and saved lives with helmets, incubators and equipment for clean drinking water. It also led to our throw away culture where things such as plastic bags and food wrappers have a useful life of minutes, or a few hours, yet may stay in the environment for hundreds of years.

Every year eight million tons of plastic waste escapes into the sea, the equivalent of putting five bin bags full of waste on every foot of coastline in the world. This plastic breaks down into small particles called microplastics which have spread throughout the world, having been found on Mount Everest and the deepest parts of the ocean. They have been found in drinking water systems and in the air that we breathe.

How can we address this problem in order to minimise its effects on the planet and the future of our grandchildren? We can shop at supermarkets that are changing their packaging in order to use less plastic; we can stop buying water in plastic bottles and use our own containers; we can buy loose fruit and vegetables; we can email our councillors - all of whom are members of the Green Party; we can email our MP who is a member of the Conservative Party; we can separate out waste carefully when we throw plastic into our recycling bins.



We must do the best we can for the future of our grandchildren.

HOW TO LISTEN TO A SERMON ...

How many sermons have I heard in my life? Lots.

And how many times has someone given me some idea of how to listen to a sermon? To be honest - up until a couple of weeks ago, never!

So when I came across some advice, it seemed like it would be good to share it with anyone else who week by week listens to someone preaching. Here's a summary....

Immediately before the sermon

Pray for the preacher as they speak, and yourself as you listen.

During the sermon

- Keep the readings to hand so you can refer to them if necessary.
- Expect to hear from God. Recognise that God has something to say to *you*. Be open to what he might say.
- Focus on how it links in with *your* experience and circumstances. Don't think about how good the message is for 'someone else'.
- Don't worry if you miss something keep listening and 'pick up the thread' again whenever you can.
- Don't try to remember everything. Work out one point to take away with you
 different people will take different points away and that's fine.

After the sermon

- Turn 'your' point into a prayer and a commitment what does God want me to do?
- Share and discuss the sermon with someone else. Discuss the sermon not the preacher!
- Maybe talk to the preacher about the sermon. Don't be afraid to ask questions or share your own thoughts.
- Put what you have heard into action!

And if you have other hints or tips, please share them with me!

CARING FOR THOSE IN NEED

ADAVU: six new clients were allocated to Liisa and her team just after the start of 2024. Every single one of their clients is a result of trafficking, whether from abroad or within the UK. Trafficking can (and does) happen anywhere; it doesn't have to be across borders, it may be even in the same town or street. It is when people are brought to, or moved around, a country or place and forced to work or do other things they don't want to.



Traffickers use violence, threats, grooming or false promises of well-paid jobs and a better life to trick their victims into working for them. This is known as Modern Slavery. Examples would include forced/sham marriages, sexual exploitation, domestic servitude, forced labour, or forced criminality (such as benefit fraud or moving drugs across county lines).

Men, women and children of all ages are victims of trafficking. Fears of the police, being imprisoned, being deported are very real and deter victims (who by this time have had their passports/identity papers/self-esteem taken from them) from escaping. It takes great courage to run.

They need tremendous support, both psychological and practical, to begin their new lives. And this where ADAVU comes in; and you, who regularly come up trumps with toiletries, layettes, etc.

THANK YOU FOR CARING, and please keep looking in the weekly pew slip for requests.

FOOD BANK: you may remember that last month I told you about The Pantry? This is quite a different scheme from the Trussell Food Banks which this parish continues to support. The Pantry is a scheme whereby folks pay a small amount (say £5?) and may choose several items from assorted boxes to their own taste and needs. The Springfield Trust will organise the one in Sparkhill - in a different part of St John's church, and on a different day, from the Food Bank which we support. Their foods, both fresh and frozen, will be sourced quite differently ... and staffed by different volunteers. It is hoped to start this in mid-February - we will watch this effort at encouraging independence with great interest and report back to you.



"Our" Food Bank is busier than ever. We have also started offering basic household items to folks who have been moved to the area suddenly and have nothing - your recent donations of plates, bowls, saucepans etc. have been so very gratefully received. Thank you on their behalf.

We are also offering books and small toys to Small Beings who come with their parents – some lovely smiles!

GrowBaby: (at St Michael's Church, Redstone Farm Road) is open without referrals or appointments on Tuesday mornings in term time. They offer clothing and equipment from maternity to five years old. Current requests are mentioned in the pew slips.

The minutes of last year's AGM, held on the 2nd February 2023, were read out by Mary Appleby and accepted as a true record of the meeting. The branch report covering last year was given by Liz Yates, followed by the Treasurer's report. Susan Knight went through the Statement of Accounts with explanations where necessary. Donations to the following have been made by the branch:-

Following the formal business, refreshments were served.

We look forward to welcoming Jo Roberts Hill to our next meeting on **Wednesday 6th March** at 2pm in Church House who will be speaking on 'Finn's Story'.

Sunday 10th March – Mothering Sunday - the service at St James Church will focus on the work of the Mothers' Union with a display in Church.

All our meetings are held in Church House at 2pm on the first Wednesday in the month except for the August meeting.

Visitors are most welcome to any of our meetings.

THE POD PROJECT - UPDATE

Our project to install a toilet and cupboard kitchenette in the south transept of St James Church is progressing steadily.

We have a Faculty (permission from the Diocese), permission under Buildings Regulation and an engineer is planning the drain connection with Severn Trent. All we need is the funds!

The Parish has made a magnificent fundraising effort, raising £14800 with donations, a variety of events and activities and we have yet to receive Gift Aid on some of this, which will boost the kitty.

We are very grateful to the Grimmitt Trust, a charity based in King's Heath, for an early donation which got us started. We have had a pledge from the Beatrice Laing Trust and very generous donations from the Edward Cadbury Trust and the Solihull MBC CIL Fund. (CIL stands for Community Infrastructure Levy and is a charge on building projects which creates funds for local improvement schemes).

Other grant applications are being considered and a generous donation from the Friends of St James at their recent meeting means that we now have over 50% of the project costs. This allows us to apply to the National Churches Trust, a major grant-giver for projects such as ours.

We can be cautiously optimistic about being able to start the project in late summer/early autumn and I am very grateful to the contractors, who are holding their quotes until August.

This is a very big undertaking and your support with fundraising, encouragement and especially prayer is greatly appreciated.

SHIRLEY PARISH BOOK CLUB

'Before the Coffee Gets Cold' - Toshikazu Kawaguchi



One of our members recommended this novel and then at our meeting it transpired, weirdly, that two of our members' grandchildren (and a sister) also urged their relatives to read it!


It's about a cafe in Tokyo where customers have the chance to travel in time - but there are rules. You cannot change the present through your visit. You must meet with someone who has also visited the cafe. You must return to the cafe before your coffee gets cold. Access to the past is via a particular seat in the cafe which is for most of the time occupied by a woman in a white dress. She is a ghost who leaves her seat, and the book she is reading, only once a day. To visit the toilet!

In this, the first of four novels, there are four journeys into the past. Everyone in our Book Club was swept along by the various encounters - and everyone realised that even though no one could change the past, each of them comes to understand, rather than alter, what had happened to them and those they love in earlier days.

Members of the group were mostly happy with what they read - despite the difficulty of coming to terms with all the Japanese names. Some liked it so much they have gone on to read other novels in the series. The most perceptive point made to explain some of the reservations was that the author is a playwright and this story first appeared as a play. Clearly, he leaves some character development to actors and to the reader.

The next Book Club read is called 'Washington Black' by Esi Edugyan recommended by one of the Sunday papers as a best read for 2024 and shortlisted for the Booker Prize a couple of years ago. Some of us are already into it and finding it 'a rattling good read'.

Our next meeting is on **Monday 18th March, 2pm, Church House**. Be there. As Toshikazu Kawaguchi might say, you cannot change the world through reading, but you can come to understand it better.



OUR SUNDAY LUNCH CLUB

I am very proud to be part of the volunteer team that has been providing Sunday Lunches for over a year now. Our mission statement is "To provide companionship and a quality home cooked meal in a safe environment for people within the Parish on a Sunday, that would benefit from this service." Payment of the three-course meal, including soft drinks, tea or coffee and mints is left to the discretion of the diners. However, we are self-funding so rely on contributions and a few donations to maintain the service. I am pleased to say that from comments received, we mostly achieve this, due to the dedication, hard work and love of the team involved.

As with all services/processes though, change is inevitable and good to keep things current and fresh. We pride ourselves on listening to comments, both good and not so good as to how we can improve. The old adage "You can't please all of the people all of the time" is very true, though sometimes I think I can't please any of the people any of the time (?!), so there often has to be a compromise. However, first and foremost we are doing this in Christ's service so that drives our actions.

Therefore, taking into account all of the above we will be making the following changes for 2024:

- We are re-branding the service as 'Sunday Lunch/Afternoon Tea Pay as you Feel'
- Sunday Lunch will be provided alternative months on the third Sunday of the month
- Afternoon Tea with an activity (such as Bingo, Quiz) will be provided alternative months on the third Sunday of the month
- Slight reduction in the Sunday Lunch choices (Vegetarian, gluten free and diabetics will still be catered for)
- Sign up sheet will also include the dessert option (to cut down on waste and cost)
- Number of places limited to thirty (so as not to overload the facilities)

Please do contact me if you have any queries.

If there is anyone who would like to join the team you would be most welcome. We have a lot of fun, laughs, a few disasters and great friendship. You do not need to be able to cook, as there are a number of other tasks that you could help with, and it doesn't need to be every month either. Just have a chat with me.






LOOKING FOR THE RESURRECTION

An old couple are driving down the motorway when the wife gets a call from their daughter. 'Mum, there's a car driving the wrong way down the motorway!' The wife warns her husband that there is a lunatic on the motorway. Her husband, clutching the wheel in terror, replies: 'One lunatic? There are dozens of them, all headed straight for us!' What we see is determined by our perspective on life.

In the Nicene Creed we say: 'We look for the resurrection of the dead, and the life of the world to come.' In the gospel accounts of the Resurrection, there is a lot of looking and seeing. Mary Magdalene, Mary the mother of James and Salome went early to the tomb. They saw the stone rolled aside and inside the tomb a young man dressed in white said to them: 'Don't be alarmed. You are looking for Jesus the Nazarene, who was crucified. He has risen! He is not here. See the place where they laid Him...He is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see Him' (Mark 16: 6,7).

Like the women we would probably have been left 'trembling and bewildered' by what we saw that morning. Had the body been taken? Was the young man an angel or deceiver? Was Jesus raised to life again, or was this an elaborate hoax?



MAUNDY THURSDAY (28th March) WORDSEARCH

On Maundy Thursday we recall the final command that Jesus gave to His disciples before His death. After the Last Supper, He rose and washed His disciples' feet. This was astonishing for a 'teacher' to do, but He had a firm purpose in mind: "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another." His disciples were to love through service, not domination, of one another.

In Latin, the opening phrase of this sentence is 'mandatum novum do vobis'. The word 'mundy' is thus a corruption of the Latin 'mandatum' (or command). The 'washing of the feet' ceremony was an important part of the medieval church's liturgy, symbolising the humility of the clergy, in obedience to the example of Christ.






