
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


I have had to take a real good look at myself too, am I friendly and approachable?

On <u>Sunday 3rd March</u> – the subject is 'Being the church in the week – looking outwards' and it will cover the things that we do as church; the areas of the community we are involved with. How we talk to people about what we believe. Key verse – Matthew 28:19

This year's **Lent Groups** will be taking a further look at the subjects covered in the series. These groups will give us the opportunity to share our thoughts and ideas about how we might move forward.

The groups will each be following the same material, so you don't have to go to the same group every week – it's fine to move around if it's more convenient.



The sermons during Lent will cover the same themes as the Lent Groups -

<u>10th March</u> – Our focus and plan <u>17th March</u> – Our culture <u>24th March</u> – Our calling and journeys <u>31st March</u> – Mothering Sunday <u>7th April</u> – Our worship

'GOING FOR GROWTH' - LENT GROUPS

Week commencing 10th March – Focus and Plan

How growth is a sign of life in nature; looking at aspects of growth (numerical, spiritual and service); looking forward three years and what do we see; seeing the importance of prayer, presence, proclamation and persuasion – and planning!

Key verse – Matthew 13:32

Week commencing 17th March – Our culture

How we can develop a community of invitation and welcome.

Looking at things like: How would church seem to someone who has never been before? Would they come back? Do we make them feel welcome? Remembering of course that it's what they think that matters, not what we think!

Key verse – Matthew 25:40

Week commencing 24th March – Our calling

How can we tell our story, and help other people as they seek for faith. Looking at what do we think is good about being a Christian; what we understand by evangelism; how we can pray for specific people and how we can talk about how our story meets God's story.

Key verse – Luke 19:10

Week commencing 31st March – Journeys to faith and in faith

How we can grow deeper in our relationship with God. Looking at our journeys with God; looking at the progression from being someone who is searching, to some who follows Jesus, to someone who serves him and then to someone who has the confidence to tell others. Thinking about the stepping stones to faith. *Key verse – Philippians 3:12*

Week commencing 7th April - Our worship

How we can ensure that our worship helps the church to grow in all senses. Looking at how our worship can help us on our journeys; thinking about how friendly it would be to people who are not used to church. Does our worship lift us?

Key verse – John 4:24

We do hope that you will be able to join in - all are welcome and we'd love to hear your thoughts and ideas.




As I write, the next three sermons in the series are yet to be preached but I am sure that they will be just as thought provoking as the first two.

This development is an example of the wonderfully rich sense of possibility that is a feature of current thinking about ministry. BBC TO RUN A 'YEAR OF BELIEFS'

The BBC is going to 'shine a light' on faith and spiritual values in Britain today by running a year of programmes dedicated to religion and ethics.

The move comes a year after the BBC promised to 'raise our game' in the way that it treated religion. That promise followed a year-long review of its religious and ethics output.

So what series should we look out for? Here are just some:

On BBC 1, *Earth's Sacred Wonders* will look at the rituals and monuments of faith around the world; *Medical Ethics* will be a documentary filmed at Great Ormond Street Hospital; and *Pregnant and Platonic* will be a documentary on people who have children without being in a romantic relationship.

On BBC 2, *Inside the Vatican* will show a year in the life of the Vatican community, including Pope Francis; and the popular *Pilgrimage* series will return.

The Bishop of Repton, the Rt. Revd. Jan McFarlane, who chairs the Sandford St

Martin Trust, welcomed the BBC's plans. Especially "bringing issues of faith, belief and ethics to as wide an audience as possible."

SHROVE TUESDAY - PANCAKE DAY - MARCH 5th

Ever wonder why we eat pancakes just before Lent? The tradition dates back to Anglo-Saxon times, when Christians spent Lent in repentance and severe fasting.

So on the Tuesday before Ash Wednesday, the church bell would summon them to confession, where they would be 'shriven', or absolved from their sins, which gives us *Shrove* Tuesday. At home, they would then eat up their last eggs and fat, and making a pancake was the easiest way to do this. For the next forty seven days, they pretty well starved themselves.

Pancakes feature in cookery books as far back as 1439, and today's pancake races are in remembrance of a panicked woman back in 1445 in Olney, Buckinghamshire. She was making pancakes when she heard the shriving bell calling her to confession. Afraid she'd be late, she ran to the church in a panic, still in her apron, and still holding the pan.



Flipping pancakes is also centuries old. A poem from Pasquil's Palin in 1619 runs: "And every man and maide doe take their turne, And tosse their Pancakes up for feare they burne."

Some people have noted that the ingredients of pancakes can be used to highlight four significant things about this time of year: eggs stand for creation, flour is the staff of life, salt keeps things wholesome, and milk stands for purity.

Shrove Tuesday is always forty seven days before Easter Sunday and falls between 3rd February and 9th March.

MAKING SENSE OF LENT

This month sees the start of Lent, the six-week period leading up to Easter. In the early Church, it was a time when new converts were instructed in the faith, ready for their baptism at Easter. Over the years, Lent has become a season of penitence, self-examination and fasting. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for forty days and taught his disciples to fast, *'when you fast..'* (Matthew Chapter 6 verse 17).

MAKING SENSE OF LENT continued

Fasting might involve missing one or two meals in a day, refraining from TV or alcohol, or whatever gets in the way of us fully focusing on God. What are the reasons for fasting?

- The act of giving up something is a tangible sacrifice to God, reminding us of our desire to put him first in our lives.
- Giving up things I value shows me how dependent I can be on other things rather than God.
- Fasting helps me to surrender my 'idols' to God.
- When fasting I am reminded of a deeper hunger and need for God in my life: 'Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness, for they will be filled.' (Matthew Chapter 5 verse 6). I learn to be more dependent on God, while releasing the stuff I depend on in my life.

Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines e.g. joining a study group, *'random acts of kindness'*, giving more time to prayer and Bible study.

Whatever you do, have a great Lent!

BE READY. BE WISE. BE CLEAR.

In **Acts Chapter Eight** we read the story of a high-profile leader who was won to Christ. This man held a position similar to the Chancellor of the Exchequer. And he was led to Christ by a low-profile person called Philip, a church deacon.

Lets look at how it happened and see what we can learn:

 Philip was ready. When this man needed someone to explain the gospel to him, Philip was ready to do it.
 Could you have done that?
 When God has a job that needs to be done, could He call on you?
 Would you be prepared?
 And willing?
 'If anybody asks you why you believe as you do ... tell him' (1 Peter 3 verse 15)

2) **Philip was wise**. He didn't barge in and start preaching, or put this man on the spot by asking 'gotcha' questions. Note two things about Philip: a) he was led by God's spirit and b) he recognised the right moment. Good soul-winners are sensitive and strategic.

3) **Philip was clear.** Instead of a vague dialogue about religion, he spoke directly about Jesus. That's what people need - a relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ! They need to know He's alive, and that He loves them. That He's powerful enough to run the universe, yet personal enough to forgive their sins, break their habits, and resolve their doubts.

Your job is to extent the invitation, and let Jesus do the rest. Do you need a soul-winning strategy? Try this one - it works!

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SIGNS & SYMBOLS : THE BELLS, THE BELLS!

Last month we thought about 'crossing ourselves' and in a way I wanted to continue that by asking 'when would you cross yourself?' I can recall people doing it almost superstitiously at times of danger, seeing an ambulance rushing on the road or even as a sign of gratitude at good news.

Many sign themselves to psychologically draw a line before and after their time of prayer. Marking out that time as 'special'. I continue to do so before I eat a meal as a sign of gratitude for the food I shall consume and a request that God will use it to strengthen me to serve him in my day.

Many times in church I notice people do so when the prayer of the Trinity, Father, Son and Holy Ghost is mentioned.

Did you know that church bells also were and still are sometimes used to reinforce 'holy points'? In the Church of England, Canon Law still requires every church and chapel to provide at least one bell to ring the people to divine service (Canon F8).

When church services were held in Latin (not so long ago!) a bell was usually rung prior to the saying of any and all Trinitarian prayers to forewarn the people so that they could join in with that prayer and specific action. In some churches this continues today even though it is the language of the country being used.

Bells may also be rung at other significant points such as the lifting of the consecrated bread and wine.

Whilst the bells were normally handbells, within rural communities where locals were unable to attend the service due to farming obligations the tower bell may also be rung so they could effectively 'join in as they are able'.

ADAVU, FOOD & CLOTHING BANKS - update

ADAVU: thanks to the Gift Tree donations at Christmas we were able to give at least two presents to the children and one to the adults, in addition to some new underwear and toiletries.

It's all comparatively straight forward except for the six to nine year old boys; too old for colouring books, cannot have Lego etc. because of the tiny pieces lying around with younger siblings in cramped accommodation, no electronic toys or computer games. At the last moment we bought up Tesco's supplies of small torches! This year I am starting early – very early - getting the idea is the hardest part. I did wonder about those plastic square puzzles we used to have where you slide small squares around to make up a picture? Or bouncing balls which light up? If you have any bright ideas, I would love to hear from you!

Recently Liisa asked for emergency clothing and toiletries for a client admitted to hospital: the daughters of a lady who recently died before she could wear any of the hospital clothing they had bought for her, donated it all to us and within twenty four hours Liisa had her request satisfied!

The lady had been a staunch supporter of ours for many years - she would have been thrilled to know that even at the end she helped someone in need. The large Christmas prezzie bags which you sent in are safely stored at the bottom of the wardrobe, thank you. I have plans to use even the bottle bags - stacking up toy cars, new underwear, toiletries and games inside them.

FOOD BANK: such a busy time recently. You have been wonderful in donating small bags of sugar and dried milk - would that other donors were so helpful. We still have pallets of baked beans and pasta despite giving out double quantities for many months!

We were delighted to welcome Margaret Barber to our Wednesday team, a much needed steady and reliable pair of hands. The work of sorting, dating and packing food parcels is rather repetitive and hardly wildly exciting but is quietly satisfying – if you could spare a couple of hours once a week or fortnight, do arrange to come and have a look and see if you would like to join us. I should warn you that there's a lot of standing on some hard-concrete floors – high heels are not advisable!

WORDSEARCH - 25 YEARS OF ORDAINING WOMEN

25 years ago, on 12th March 1994, the first 32 women priests in the Church of England were ordained. It happened in Bristol Cathedral, and Bishop Barry Rogerson ordained them in alphabetical order; so Angela Berners-Wilson was considered the very first woman to be ordained. She is now chaplain at the University of Bath and prebendary at Wells Cathedral. The youngest was Karen MacKinnon, now spiritual care manager at Southampton Hospital. Ten years later, one in five priests was a woman. Of the 542 candidates entering training this year, more than half (274) are women, which is 19 per cent more than last year.


