

OUR CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL

There was a little boy in our pew, (I recognised him from 'Journey to the Stable') he was really good at the clip-clops and was disappointed when the instruments were collected in once we had used them.

For our prayers Linda A had given us a label each and asked us to write on it. On one side a person and situation far away that we were worried about, and on the other a person and situation nearby. She called them 'home and away' prayers and asked us to hang them on our Christmas trees at home to remember to say those prayers. But I lost mine on the way home.

And one other really good thing. When Kate L-J played for the carols she wasn't on her own. There was a boy playing the trumpet with her. He was really good so I asked Sarah if she thought he practised really hard. 'I'm sure he does', she said, 'but I think that to play that naturally he must be very talented as well'. So thank you Jake for coming to play for our carols.

Towards the end we got to open our envelopes. Inside were the pieces to make a little angel to wave when we sang the last song. Bernard helped me with mine. Afterwards Kate D said that they looked really good when we all waved them.

After the service was finished we had drinks and cake at the back of church. Some of us had a piece of the cake that the children had made in Messy Church. It had been decorated by Sue P with the Messy Church logo on the top and looked magnificent.

So a big thank you to all the people who helped at the tree festival and at the carols. It was brilliant.

THE ADAVU CHRISTMAS PARTY

I thought that you would like to know what a great success the ADAVU party was on December 19th.

There were about twenty ladies, some with babes in arms who were passed around like 'Pass the Parcel' and seemed to enjoy the experience! Two boys of four were VERY excited and rushed around screaming in between playing with the toy cars I had taken (memo to self for next time: remember to replace those cars most of which went missing by the end of the party!). One small girl loved her fairy costume, sitting on her mother's lap the whole time without the confidence to join in with the games - though the wings did get in the way at mealtime.

Some older children were at school, but they were included in the parcels of presents of course, as were the adults who could not come due to travel or emotional reasons. Liisa will deliver those parcels personally.

I had taken three large Ikea bags of clean babies' and children's clothing and the mothers rummaged happily through those, stuffing large plastic bags with their finds. I had prepared bags of colouring books with felt-tip pens and crayons – they were very popular, and everyone was taken home for Christmas presents. Most of the toddlers' books were taken too.

The hot meal of rice, two types of curry, cold bean salads and pizza was well received though it was the cake table which was the chief success as we remembered from the previous year. I had taken lots of empty ice-cream boxes (courtesy of Alcester Ladies Inner Wheel) and the ladies crammed those with the cakes which they wanted to take home with them, before settling down to eat cakes as a dessert (and seconds).

Father Christmas mingled amongst us: sadly some of the youngsters were terrified at seeing him and he had to remove his hat and beard early in the proceedings.

Several ladies sat at a table doing craft work and colouring. Others chatted away in a variety of languages, very delighted to meet up with up with ladies from the same country – Albanian was the prominent language, though there were folks from Nigeria, Thailand and Poland too.

When home time came, there was much hugging and kissing as they went off to catch their buses (usually two) weighed down with bags of presents, clothing and of course, cakes.

The feedback was that "it was the best party ever"- so we owe an enormous 'Thank You' to the people who made it possible - the donors of money to fund it (particularly Shirley Lions who came to the rescue at the last moment with a sizeable donation when one of last year's donors dropped out), the donors of presents through the Gift Tree Scheme at the churches of Shirley Parish and the bakers/suppliers of cakes – well done, everyone. You gave a lot of joy to folks who have had very little in their lives of late.

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THE PRACTICE OF EXAMEN

Our reflective worship service at the start of January focussed on our encounters with God in our everyday lives, and how we are more likely to hear him and encounter him if we are looking and are expectant.

We finished the evening by modelling the practice of examen (a Latin word for "a means of examining") whereby at the end of each day we review the day and think about the times and places where we have encountered God. I thought it would be helpful to share that practice with a wider audience as many of us might find it helpful.

An examen has six simple steps:

1. FIND A PLACE TO BE STILL

Wherever you are, sit comfortably and be still. Relax, but try to be attentive to yourself and to God.

2. GIVE THANKS FOR THE GOOD THINGS OF TODAY

Recall one moment that you are grateful for from today. Remember how you felt. Notice these feelings and reflect that all good things come from God. Offer your thanks.

3. LET GO OF THINGS BOTHERING YOU

What's on your mind at the moment? What is making you feel awkward or anxious? Raise these things to God and ask for the freedom that comes with the presence of the Holy Spirit.

4. REVIEW YOUR DAY

Try to recall the other events of the day. Reflect on what has happened and how you feel about it. Trust the Holy Spirit to show you the things that are important to think through and the insights that are important to know.

5. TALK WITH GOD

Tell God anything that comes to mind – jot it down, speak it out or think it through. God already knows our needs, this is to help us identify what we need to be aware of, let go or recognize.

6. FINISH YOUR PRAYER

An examen prayer can take a few minutes or a good hour. However long you have been able to give, offer this time to God with a closing prayer. The traditional compline prayer is one that could be used:

Before the ending of the day, Creator of the world, we pray That you, with steadfast love, would keep Your watch around us while we sleep.

From evil dreams defend our sight, From fears and terrors of the night; Tread underfoot our deadly foe That we no sinful thought may know.

O Father, that we ask be done Through Jesus Christ, your only Son; And Holy Spirit, by whose breath Our souls are raised to life from death. Amen





REFLECTING ON TIME

I have been thinking a lot lately about how our lives are ruled by time.

The reason for this is because as Graham has been so poorly everything revolves around time.

For myself the day begins when the alarm clock rings and tells (me it is time to get up and go off to work. Once I have checked that Graham is going to be ok, I go off to work where I sign in to say what time I have arrived there.

My work resolves around time too; I have to log what time I got a person up, what time they had breakfast and a drink, how much time I spent chatting to them and what time is my allotted break and then when it's time to leave I have clock out.

When I arrive home, it then is often time to take Graham to maybe the doctors or a hospital appointment. This requires a certain amount of time too now, as I have to load up the car with a wheelchair and oxygen.

Then we also have to remember who is calling and what time they will be arriving, like the physio nurse, or Emma our lovely palliative care nurse.

Today it was time for our District Nurse and she notices our photo of when we were licensed as Readers and we have a big discussion about church and all that churches provide outside of Sunday services . This was an eye opener for her and she is going to check out what's on at her local church in Bromsgrove.

Then it got us thinking about all the time it takes to write a sermon, prepare a service, Messy Church, Open the Book, put on the Ploughman Lunches, the Tuesday Cafe, the coffee mornings, the Quingo and all the other events our Parish offers.

The vicar's time in all he has to do, and everyone else who supports him to keep our churches running like clockwork.

But when I really stop and think of all the time it takes to do all of the above, I realise it's all in God's own time. It's his way of using us all to do his work.

But he also gives us sleep - time to recuperate and also for him to listen to our prayers. I had just been saying my prayers to him when I heard him say "Stop be still, know that I am God and write about taking time out ".

So I have taken this time out as I realise I haven't written for the magazine for months now, but also because I realise that everyone needs to be still and allow God to speak, although he uses us to do his work, he also wants to talk to us, he won't mind if you are a few minutes late or can't get to a meeting that day for everything is done in God's own time.

So next time you feel you are running out of time remember this - it's all in God's good time, Amen.

I wonder if 2020 will see an improvement ...



LOOKING AHEAD TO LENT IN OUR PARISH

Last year we launched our bid to become an Eco Church. This is all about us as individuals and as churches taking seriously a concern for the environment and doing all we can to care for God's creation. Our Lent course this year will be based on a booklet from the Archbishops called "Care for God's Creation". The booklet provides a short reading for each day in Lent, together with a practical challenge for each day. We have put together a five week discussion course

which is based on the daily readings and can be done in conjunction with them or independent of them.

Booklets will be available from all three churches in the weeks leading up to Lent and we would ask for a small donation of £1.50 to cover the cost of the booklet. Even if you can't commit to one of the courses, the booklet can be used separately.



In addition to this we plan to run the START course again. This is ideal for anyone who wants to know more about what the Christian faith is all about, and also a good opportunity for anyone who would just like a refresh of the basics. Its format is discussion based following a couple of easy to follow video clips.





The Psalm 23 Garden at RHS Chelsea Flower Show 2020, designed by Sarah Eberle, will offer visitors the chance "to stop, reflect, and feel refreshed".

The Bible Society said: "This powerful psalm, with its visual imagery of green pastures, still waters and the valley of the shadow of death, just cries out to be turned into a garden. LOVE IN ACTION!

The writer Gary Chapman describes the five 'love languages' as words of encouragement, quality time, gifts, acts of service and touch. Do you have a preferred 'language of love'?

With the approach of St Valentines' Day, let's ask: what is God's love language? 'Dear children, let us not love with words or speech but with actions and in truth.' (1 John 3:18). God's love is expressed in the word agape, which is exclusively found in the



New Testament. Greek has a number of words for love e.g. empathetic, friendship or sexual, but agape is defined uniquely by Jesus. 'This is how we know what love is: Jesus Christ laid down His life for us. And we ought to lay down our lives for our brothers and sisters.' (1 John 3:16) It provides the model for how we should love others.

Agape love is self-giving: it is ready to put the other person first, just as Jesus gave His life for us on the cross by dying in our place. Are we generous with our time, words, money and service to others?

LOVE IN ACTION! continued

Agape love takes the initiative: are we ready to show love to those who don't deserve it? Do we have eyes of compassion to see the needs around us and a heart to reach out to them?

Agape love is intentional: are we ready to get close to those in need around us, irrespective of what time we have or how we feel?

The story is told of Jesus asking a little child, 'how much do you love me?' The child replied 'lots and lots and lots!' They then asked Jesus how much He loved them. Jesus stretched out His arms wide and said 'I love you this much', as they nailed Him to a cross.

ASH WEDNESDAY - 26th FEBRUARY

At the end of this month Ash Wednesday introduces the Christian preparation for Easter, which normally coincides with Passover, the major Jewish celebration of the year. It's near Easter because Jesus was crucified at Passover, having just shared this very meal with his disciples.



Passover celebrates and recalls the Israelites' escape from slavery in Egypt. Led by Moses they crossed the Red Sea and forty days later entered the 'Promised Land' They

and forty days later entered the 'Promised Land.' They shared the Passover meal at their last night in Egypt and have kept it all for nearly the past three thousand years or so that have followed.

Many years ago, when I was in Jerusalem to produce a radio programme, I was invited to join a Jewish family for their Passover meal. It was a great occasion, very like our Christmas, a family event with deep religious significance for those who seek it.

At the meal in Jerusalem we ate modest lentils and unleavened bread – Matzos as we now call it. We also drank plenty of wine but not from the cup at the end of the table. That is 'Elijah's cup', only to be drunk from when the prophet comes to announce the arrival of the Messiah. Fast from words ... and be silent so you can listen



LENT FASTING

This month sees the start of Lent, the season of penitence, self-examination and fasting running up to Easter. Fasting can be a neglected discipline, but it plays an important part in the Christian life. Jesus began His earthly ministry by fasting in the wilderness for forty days and He taught His disciples to fast (i.e. not if but 'when you fast, put oil on your head and wash your face, so that it will not be obvious to others that you are fasting, but only to your Father, who is unseen.' (Matthew 6:17,18).

Why Fast?

Firstly, giving up something in my life underlines my desire to put God first in my life. Secondly, fasting shows me how much I depend on things other than God in my life, so I can surrender my idols to Him. Thirdly, fasting encourages me to have a deeper hunger and dependency for God in my life. Therefore, fasting gives me space to humbly focus on God for His strength, provision, and wisdom and results in a more intimate relationship with Christ. It also enables the Holy Spirit to reveal my true spiritual condition, leading to brokenness, repentance, and a transformed life, with a heart more attentive to God.

How can I fast?

Usually fasting involves missing one or two meals during the day, although some can't abstain from food for medical reasons. It might also include abstaining or limiting the time I give to television, alcohol or social media. However, Lent can also be a time to embrace new spiritual disciplines e.g. joining a study group, 'random acts of kindness', or giving more time to prayer and Bible study.

Whatever you do, make Lent count this year!



WORDSEARCH - CANDLEMAS - 2nd FEBRUARY

In New Testament times forty days old was an important age for a baby boy: it was when they made their first 'public appearance'. Mary, like all good Jewish mothers, went to the Temple with Jesus, her first male child - to 'present him to the Lord'. At the same time, she, as a new mother, was 'purified'. Thus we have the Festival of the Presentation of Christ in the Temple, forty days after Christmas.

Jesus is described in the Bible as the Light of the World, and so early Christians developed the tradition of lighting many candles in celebration of this day. The Church also fell into the custom of blessing the year's supply of candles for the church on this day - hence the name, Candlemas. The story can be found in Luke 2:22-40.

Simeon's great declaration of faith and recognition of who Jesus was is found in the Nunc Dimittis, which is embedded in the Office of Evening Prayer in the West.


The regular Monday night choir practice of this church will be held on Tuesday night instead of Friday night.

MAKING FABRIC BAGS FOR THE FOOD BANK

In this New Year, let's continue to work together to reduce the number of plastic bags through our ongoing project to send fabric bags for food distribution from the Food Bank. The red box at the back of St James Church containing fabric bag kits has been replenished so please call in and collect one if you are able. If you already have fabrics, new or used, and just need instructions, here they are:

- Cut a piece of fabric approximately 110cm (44") wide and 50cm (20") deep and another two pieces for handles approximately 38 cm (15") long.
- Fold the 110 cm (44") length in two and sew along the other side and the bottom. French seams make the bag strong (i.e. sew with the right side of the material on the outside then turn inside out, sew again to conceal the raw edges, now on the inside). On more modern sewing machines, over sewing suffices.
- Iron the bag to make two fold marks down each side. Measure about 10cm (4") at the bottom to make the bag "stand up" on its base which will eventually be made firm by the insertion of the piece of card. Pull a triangular shape at each bottom side, using the ironed lines as a middle guide on each side. Sew these triangles on the inside of the bag and iron.
- Neaten the top edge. Make the handles and join to the two top sides of the bag. Oversew where the handle joins the bag to ensure they are strong enough to carry weight.

Thank you again to everyone for such an encouraging response so far: bag makers, donators of fabrics and cottons and those passing on the idea to other groups and churches. We are starting to make a difference.

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
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
