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

JOURNEY TO THE STABLE 2023

At the end of the Journey in 2022 Paul and I agreed that we needed a new nativity play. And I had the mad idea to get it written by a group of people. We met in May to set out what was needed, and several months and two draft versions later we hoped we had what was needed. Our first run through, to check the timing, was hilarious with four people reading all of the parts. Our second, with a full cast, and using our stage, was fruitful if scary in parts. We had a play.

'Old Joseph' and 'Old Mary' sat reminiscing about what happened when Jesus was born. Shepherds and wise people visited, and an angel voice echoed spookily round the church with an angel image on the screen. The heavenly host played a trumpet fanfare, and the star remained firmly in place over the manager.

We were visited by 550 children from 11 schools during the week, and as well as the play they did Christmas related activities around the church. There were sheep to cuddle in the shepherd's fields, gold, frankincense, and myrrh in the wise man's house. The children made a decoration from craft sticks, and went into our 'Christmas room' where they learned how modern customs link back to the original story.



One of the highlights of our play is the entry of Jesus, played by a number of different 2023 babies. They bring their Mums with them to take the part of a young Mary and when they are carried in the children gasp in delight. The babies make it such a memorable occasion and we are so grateful to this year's stars (and their Mums).

The new play meant new lines to learn, different places to stand and some of our team were apprehensive. But every session worked and as the week progressed, we felt more and more confident. Thanks to everyone on the team, often working beyond their comfort zone, in the play or running the activities, or helping to keep the children safe. Without you all none of this would be possible. And thank you also the people who went along with the mad idea to have a play written by a group of people. We know that some teachers visit every year and have commented on how they liked the changes.

No-one is quite sure how long we have been running Journey to the Stable for. The best guess seems to be around 25 years. For those who don't know, the Journey to the Stable is a week long event in St James Church to which we invite the year 1 children (5-6 year olds) from all the local schools. We present the Christmas story using a drama (not exactly RSC standard!) and various activities that the children take part in.

Over the week children from schools come along one morning or afternoon each day – so by the end of the week between 500 and 600 children have been to the church and (usually!) enjoyed themselves immensely. We always say to the team that the most important thing is not what the children learn, but that they go away thinking that their time in church was fun and the people were welcoming.

We did a few calculations this year and reckoned that over the years around 15,000 children may well have been to the Journey! Amazing!

I would like to thank all those involved – more than 20 church members give up the whole or part of the week to be part of the team – and particularly Sarah Penfold who holds it all together.

And of course, it's not just at Christmas. A similar thing happens a few weeks before Easter each year when we invite year 5 children to hear and experience the Easter story – the Easter Journey. Put the date in your diary now - 11th to 15th March - and have a chat to Sarah if you would like to help!

MU PARTY FOR UKRAINIAN GUESTS

It is nearly two years since Russia's invasion of it's neighbour Ukraine and news coverage of the war is now sporadic in the United Kingdom - except when something noteworthy happens outside the grim realities of two armies at war. There are new conflicts claiming our attention and financial support, so we hear less about the needs of Ukraine and its people. However, a number of families have escaped to start a new life in the West Midlands, living with hosts or sponsors, while they hope for peace to come so that they can go home and rebuild. Some of us have contact with them.

Mothers' Union is an international family charity which shows God's love by caring for the wellbeing of both parents and children. Discussing the situation of Ukrainian children in Solihull, the MU branch in this parish decided we would like to offer something special to show our Ukrainian guests that we care about them. Many are women who have brought their children out of danger and left their partners to fight for the country they love. Some fathers are in the armed services, while others are doing essential work. The families living here are very aware of the dangers which are part of life for their friends and relatives living in Ukraine, and they worry about them. Their smart phones keep them in touch with the conflict. They know which towns have been hit by drones or air strikes overnight, which are struggling with no electricity or limited water supplies. So we thought it would be kind to invite them to an 'autumn party' designed for the children. A chance to forget the worries about family or the problems of living with a strange language and a different culture, for an afternoon.

About 40 guests arrived at Church House on November 18th and children ranged from 18 months to 13 years.

We were very lucky that Adam Pitt was free to bring a selection of unusual animals to meet the children and they were spellbound as he showed them each creature and explained what was special about each. The first was a beautiful snake, a young Royal Python and the children were all encouraged to carefully hold him. When an older python came from behind the screen it was so big that





all the children could hold it at the same time if they stood close together!

We met a tarantula, a chameleon, an American bullfrog, a Caribbean iguana, a snapping turtle, a skunk and a young barn owl. We discovered that they were all interesting and, that we should not be afraid of unfamiliar things, though some could be dangerous and all deserved care and respect.

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After the animals the guests enjoyed typical party food and the afternoon included games and each child took home a party bag.

We received many thanks on the day and later by email:

'I want to thank you - we had a lot of fun. Thank you for the treats and gifts for the children. Thank you for the good you do for us.' The Prokofiev family

'It was so kind of you and all who organized that amazing party for Ukrainian children. Our family had a good time and we really appreciate what you all are doing for us.

I cannot stop being amazed how you support us, how you do not stay indifferent and distant. The world has gone mad lately and people like you and your friends just give us hope that there is still place for kindness, compassion, and humanity.

My gratitude doesn't have boundaries.

Thank you very much.'

NEW YEAR

One of my delights is to read ecclesiastical diaries. What can be more enthralling than to settle down by the fire on a cold winter's night and read something of the daily life and worship of a country parson from the past? For instance, the Rev'd William Jones, Vicar of Broxbourne in Hertfordshire, records in January 1802:

'Surely the life of a clergyman, if his mind be properly disposed and attuned ... is of all lives the most happy.'

He goes on to pity the poor unfortunate who enters such a life as a mere profession or business, seeing his daily round as drudgery because his heart is not in it. He does, though, have his moments of complaint claiming that he is defrauded by some of his parishioners who 'hate to hear the word 'tithe' spoken'.

In his marriage, also, life was not all roses since he had married a lawyer's daughter who 'possesses such a wonderful volubility of speech, such a miraculous power of twirling and twisting every argument to her own interests, that I am no match for her. She has mastered better the sublime art to "puzzle right and varnish wrong" than any Old Bailey solicitor throughout the Kingdom!'

Many of us, no doubt, will have attempted to keep a diary, or some type of journal, detailing our lives over the years. For those who have managed to sustain such a discipline it can be good to look back and see the different phases through which we have passed; the ups and downs, the joys and the sorrows. Much as the astrologers of today might claim to be able to foretell the future it is, generally, unpredictable and most people feel as though they are 'hostages to fate,' a term once used by a Jewish Rabbi.

For the Christian, though, there is something else, and it is that never ending spirit of hope that accompanies us as we journey on to each New Year. We can have reason to be optimistic since we are recipients of another type of journal: the gospels. Here we can plot the ministry of Jesus; here we can enter into a life of love and compassion, a life of sacrifice and total commitment to the Will of God. Here we can take a look into the future, we can learn of a heavenly banquet prepared for the faithful, and of the promise of eternal life to those who believe.

In 1708 the Rev'd James Clegg, minister of a church near Chapelen-le-Frith, Derbyshire, wrote in his diary:

'Lord humble mee, give mee zeal, blow the fire'

perhaps that is a prayer to think about for 2024.



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A later writer, Kathy Galloway, a member of the Iona Community, wrote:

'God of our lives, you are always calling us to follow you into the future, inviting us to new ventures, new challenges, new ways to care, new ways to touch the hearts of all. When we are fearful of the unknown, give us courage. When we worry that we are not up to the task, remind us that you would not call us if you did not believe in us. When we get tired, or feel disappointed with the way things are going, remind us that you can bring change and hope, out of the most difficult situations.'

May God bless you, and yours, in the year that lies ahead.

NEW YEAR'S RESOLUTION - SMARTER RECYCLING

It's obvious, isn't it? Recycle as much as we can to reduce waste and help conserve resources. Save the planet. We all know this.

Yes, but it's far from simple. So many goods are made up of different parts which have to be handled separately and the rules keep changing. We need to get it right because mistakes can cause collections to be dumped in landfill rather than recycled.

Paper, bottles, cans are pretty straightforward (although paper hand towels and tissues are regarded as contaminated and are not recyclable) but plastic is a bit of a minefield. When the wardens empty the recycling bins in St James's Church and Church House, we are regularly dismayed by the amount of unsuitable material present, food, teabags, hand towels, cling film, balloons, tinsel, packaging labelled as unsuitable for kerb-side collection and more.

We need to get better at this! Some suggestions:

*Check any information on the packaging. If it says not recyclable or not recyclable at the kerb-side, use the rubbish bin.

*Follow the guidance on the notice on top of the recycling bin.

*Recyclable materials which are contaminated with food or soaking wet are better in the rubbish bin.

*If in doubt, it is better to use the rubbish bin than to contaminate a bin of recyclables.

We will try to find ways to remind and support everyone in this important activity and all ideas are welcome.

FOOD BANK NEWS

You may recall that David and I help out at the satellite Food Bank in St John's Church in Sparkhill. It is open each Wednesday morning and can be very busy. The volunteers work hard to create a pleasant atmosphere offering hot drinks, toast and jam, etc. whilst folks wait their turn to be served. (On arrival they are given a numbered ticket to ensure that everyone is seen in strict order - no queue jumping!) We try to give a small toy or book to each child arriving with a parent – this cheers up the child but also brings a smile to the parent's face, reducing the strain we hope. During the recent cold weather we have made sure that each child has a warm hat and mittens but we are short of warm wraps to put over their knees in the pushchairs (hint to the knitters amongst you?). But of course, the food parcels are the critical items. Some weeks the local vegetable and bread shops will let us have their leftovers from the day before, and we share those out to supplement the basic provisions in the standard bags.

Before Christmas we also had a table of new and nearly new toys, books and clothing which a parent could select for each of their children and it was gift wrapped for them to take away.

Some of the folks coming in the hope of a food parcel have only recently been moved to the area, to shared accommodation, and have nothing. Thanks to your recent donations of cutlery, we are able to provide those, but we have now run out of bowls and plates - are there any surplus at the back of your cupboard you could pass on please?

You were all so kind last year to folks just down the road who are really struggling to survive - on their behalf 'Thank You'.



SHIRLEY PARISH BOOK CLUB -COMING TO TERMS WITH GRIEF

Many of us will have had to come to terms to grief during our lives, and for those who haven't, it will come. Friends help, church helps, work sometimes helps and, of course, reading often helps. The Book Club's most recent read came to us by word of mouth from other book clubs. Grief and how to deal with it clearly occupies a lot of people.

Isaac and the Egg by Bobby Palmer begins with a man called Isaac Addy standing on a bridge thinking about jumping. He doesn't know how he got there, he can taste drink in his mouth, he can see his car at one end of the bridge, door open, lights on. In despair he screams. The river below seems to stop running, the forest goes silent and time – as Louis MacNeice's poem, 'Meeting Point' says – 'is away and somewhere else'. Then, out of the silence, something screams back. Isaac goes in search of the scream and finds, not a person as he expects, but an egg. It's about two feet tall, eerily white and breathing. Isaac instinctively knows that, like him, the egg has been abandoned. He knows he has to take the egg home.



Isaac's life has fallen apart. His wife has been killed in a car crash and he is struggling to cope with the pain of his loss. He has cut himself off from family and friends. There is something about the egg Isaac finds in the forest that responds to his pain. When he takes it home he finds it is it not just an egg. It's alive - some sort of alien – a bit like ET. As the story moves forward we see the egg trying to become human and, in the end, trying to find his way home – just as Isaac is trying to become human again after his loss and trying to find his way back to family, friends and home.

That's all folks. No spoilers. Read it. Discover the surprises at the end. Be reassured about coming through grief.

As usual, Book Club readers have differed in their responses – from 'loving it' to just being intrigued by it. The subject made some of us a bit tentative, but all felt some level of reward from staying the course. Grief has come into more than one of our novels this last year – A Terrible Kindness about Aberfan and Pigeon English about knife crime in London. Books that ask questions and challenge us to unravel answers.

For each of us in our own lives, grief often ends in some sort of consolation. Or we hope it will. So it is with *Isaac and the Egg* and so it is with us whenever we engage with our own feelings prompted by what we read.



Book Club concluded 2023 with an idea from Finland – called 'Jokabokaflud' where we gave each other a surprise book present hidden in brown paper. Then in early 2024 we will complete our list of 'best reads' for 2023 and publish the list in the February magazine.

If you like company, tea and biscuits and listening to people talk about what they have read (among other things), please look out for the February Book Club meeting in Church House. You will be welcomed with open arms – and books.

Our next read is, *Before the Coffee Gets Cold* by Toshikazu Kawaguchi. Drinking coffee and time travel!

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A WALL OF POPPIES

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We are proposing that we have a display of knitted or crocheted poppies at Remembrance time in November.

This has been done in other towns and cities and this year it is the time for Shirley Parish and our neighbours to have a go.

Several thousand poppies will be required so we need to start now.

There are many patterns available on the Internet but the one printed below is very easy, even for inexperienced knitters.

A crochet pattern is also on the next page.

Patterns will also be available from the Parish Office.

Please have a go yourself and also involve family, friends and neighbours.

Donations of red wool/yarn would be gratefully received.

Knitted Poppies

You will need

- A pair of 4mm/size 8 needles
- Any DK red yarn
- A small black button

Cast on 60 sts

Rows 1-8 (K2, P2) to the end

Row 9 (K2tog) to the end of the row (30 sts)


Row 10 Slip 1 stitch, knit 2 stitches together, then pass the slip stitch over....repeat across the whole row to end (10 sts)

Break of yarn, leaving a long tail. Thread tail through remaining 10 sts and pull tight. Join edges, fasten off yarn.

Sew a black button in the centre of the poppy.

Alternate method for the centre of the poppy

Using black yarn, cast on 16 stitches. Cast off. Coil into a spiral and sew to the centre of the poppy.



Knit To Remember Poppy Patterns

Crocheted Poppy Pattern

Yarn - Any red and black, I used DK.

Hook - 3.5mm, but try larger too to see the effect.

Size of the finished poppy should be no smaller than the paper ones sold for Remembrance Day.

The Red Bit

Round 1: Make a magic loop, make 10 dc in the loop and draw tight, join with ss.

Round 1 (alternative): Make a starting chain of 4, ss to form a circle. Make 10 dc in the circle and join with ss to first dc.

Round 2: *ch1, dc, ch1, 2tr in next st, 3tr in next st, (2tr ch1 tr) in next st, ss in next 2 st. rpt from * around and join with ss.

Round 3: *ch1 3dc in next 2 sts, 2dc in next 5 sts, 3dc in next 2 sts, ss in next 2 sts. Rpt from *around, fasten off.

The Black Bit Make a magic loop, 8dc into loop, tighten and fasten off.



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
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
